WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—Where "bumsfoot" Johnson has failed so far to put England on a strictly "aquas" basis American food delicacies and soft-drink manufacturers may partially succeed, according to a report received by the Department of Commerce from Consul Jewell, at Birmingham, England.

The consul reported that recently three American soda companies were opened in Birmingham and that they have attained great prosperity. He added, however, that owing to English conservatism, deep-rooted habits and usually cool weather, the industry will never flourish as in the United States.

24 Licenses Issued in July
ALBANY, Aug. 5.—During the month of July there were 24 marriage licenses issued and but four divorce complaints filed, a check on the books at the office of the county clerk showed this morning. During the month there were two degrees granted for divorce.

In June there were 26 marriage licenses issued. The total for July is considered to be about the average maintained in this county for some time. A total of 538 dog licenses were issued last month, bringing the total for the year up to 1890. The activity of the sheriff's office in the collection of dog licenses has caused the number to be doubled during the past two months.
