

GEMMINE WILL BE PUT TO WORK

Spokane Mining Men Buy Property in the Susanville Section.

EAKER, Aug. 4.—The Gem mine in the Susanville district changed hands today, the deal being one of interest to mining men of the state. J. J. Jennings and George Jennings are the new owners, and are well known as large developers of this district. For the past two years Eaker has been their headquarters, they having moved here from Spokane and being interested in the Delaware Mining company. In a statement today, Mr. Jennings says they are planning immediate improvements and will install an 150 horsepower hydroelectric plant and a 50 ton cyanide plant, other additions to the property to be made from time to time, the developments for the present will amount to \$45,000. At this time there is one shift employed at the property, pumping water.

A thorough examination of the mine was made by Carl M. Anderson, a mining engineer, of Portland, Oregon, some time ago and the following facts are taken from his report. The property consists of some 300 acres of mining ground and there is standing on this ground 3,000,000 feet of yellow pine timber, also a saw mill of 15,000 feet daily capacity. The property is developed by a 550 incline shaft and 1225 feet of developments which consist of drifts, cross cuts, raises and winzes. The property has 15,000 tons of ore blocked out with an average value of \$15.25 per ton.

The General Engineering Works of Salt Lake City made a series of metallurgical tests and were successful in working out a cyanide treatment whereby an extraction of 92.5 per cent was made. The total value of this ore blocked out is \$229,750, and this report shows that the ore can be mined at \$6 per ton which would leave a net profit of \$127,100 less U. S. income tax, interests, etc. The property is developed to a point where it is now ready for a plant of at least 50 tons capacity.

MILLIONAIRES TOO FEW, BRITON SAYS

LONDON, August 4.—What the world needs is more millionaires.

This astonishing remedy for the ills of the world is put forth by Sir Alfred Mond, M. P., former Minister of Health in the Lloyd George ministry. Socialism will only lead to further wars, Sir Alfred says.

Sir Alfred is the defender of capitalism in Commons, it seems. At least, he leads the cohorts in the defence of the capitalist system whenever the Laborites open up their guns.

"The millionaires," Sir Alfred declared, "is the tool to make a world of millions for other people. He is a person of utility; there are too few of them."

"It is by making people richer that you are going to make the world better. That can be done only by better production."

"If you merely talk about Bolshevism and miserable capitalism, you never get any further. Instead of trying to score points we should get together and find common points of contact, and the common points of contact are much nearer together than people think."

Sir Alfred is, of course, the arch enemy of Socialism, and holds it out as a terrible example of a world without hope. He sees in Socialism dire possibilities for the future.

"Without birth control and conscription of labor I do not think it is possible to organize the Socialist community," Sir Alfred asserted.

"I regard Socialism not as a form of ideal improvement, but as a terrible tyranny."

"I believe Socialism will lead to one war after another, because of the antagonism of nations when they have control of industrial affairs."

The view held forth by Sir Alfred is anything but new, but despite his earnest efforts the Laborites of England are proceeding with their plans and are continuing to argue against capitalism and for the capital levy.

HALFWAY BOY IS UNDER CHARGE

Was One of Four Youngsters Who Had Car Said to Be Stolen.

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 4.—Confession involving the participation in the recent sensational robbery of the Barto Confectionery, a high class Tacoma resort, and the theft of the Hudson Super-Six of J. H. Melner, of Tacoma, has been made here by Harold Gunderson, who claims Halfway, Oregon, as his home, and who is still at large with three other youths for stealing the Melner car.

Gunderson admitted to Officers Lomax and Nix, of Tacoma, who grilled him here yesterday, that he had operated in Tacoma under the names of Fred Little and Troy Bailey. He claims to be 18 years of age, although he looks 25.

By his confession he will probably serve a sentence in the Oregon state prison for helping steal the car and will be also claimed by the Washington authorities for the Barto robbery, when his time is up at Salem.

One of his accomplices in the Barto robbery and car theft is James P. Johnson, alias Bates, of Tacoma, who is also in jail here. Two other youths involved in the car theft with him are Don Loxi, of Seattle and Kenneth Hunsell, of Tacoma. Gunderson has claimed one of his aliases and his true name did not come to light until late yesterday.

The four were given a lift from Tacoma to Eugene by Melner and when the latter got out here to in-

quire about work, they stole the car and were later captured a few miles north of Roseburg.

WOULD SETTLE WITH RUSSIANS

Douglas County, Washington, May Have Large Foreign Farm Population.

SPOKANE, Wash., August 4.—Plans for bringing a colony of Russian peasants to Douglas county for the resettlement of abandoned wheat farms there were outlined at a recent meeting of the land settlement committee of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce.

Many fertile farms, it was declared, some possessing valuable improvements, had been abandoned because of crop failures and could be secured with little or no payment down and made to pay for themselves within a few years. W. H. Miller told the committee that these farms would produce bumper crops had they been planted this year.

Mr. Miller expressed the belief that mortgage men handling the land would assist the settlers in securing cattle and other stock and that they would not require any payments on the principal until at least five years after taking possession. Now the committee is seeking further information about peasant people in Russia, Austria, and Czechoslovakia.

Suicides Have Failed to Heed Laws of Universe

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 4.—"Every modern scientist will tell you suicide is prompted by refusing to observe the operation of the laws of the universe," declared Baron Eugene Persen, Russian scientist, in an address to an audience here on "Thought Control."

"We should grow stronger and wiser as we grow older. Some people are living examples of this possibility, whether they gained the knowledge of the law consciously or unconsciously," he continued.

"It is not enough to think success, for we do not live on a mental as much as a physical plane. The prize-fighter, who uses physical force, is paid more money and greater honor than the eminent scientist. We may not approve of this condition, but we must accept it and learn to handle the law accordingly. To become one with the force of the universe is to become capable of all things."

"We hear people say they don't care for success, because, as in the story of the fox and the grapes, they think they cannot get it. Legitimate success is brought out from ourselves and becomes a power to build what we want. All have the invisible voice within them, although some have it more highly developed than others."

Uses Tail for Parasol.

CHICAGO, Aug. 4.—An ant cat that uses his tail for a parasol when it is not sweeping ants into a pile for eating was brought back by Edmund Heller, a naturalist from the jungles of South America.

Among other specimens obtained by Heller was a rufous, similar to a rat, and the only animal of its kind ever brought here alive; a bird that is much valued for its oil for cooking and medicinal purposes; many specimens of the howler monkey, vampire bats and birds. The Huallaga River valley in Peru where most of them were obtained, is a savage and cannibal region, but the naturalist says the natives were not to be feared as much as the desperate criminals who fled there from the law.

"The philanthropists of today, however, Professor Darwin said 'only look on one side of the question, and entirely ignore the racial effects of the reforms they are advocating.'"

Both out-of-work doles, those constitutionally incapable of work, and out-door relief generally, if given without regard to the probability of parenthoo' in the future, would directly tend to promote the inferiority of the race in the future.

Motherhood endowment to the naturally superior and unfit alike, those and other methods of relieving distress, would have the same result, he contended.

Altogether, as viewed by Professor Darwin, there seemed to be a pretty blue outlook for the world generally, and even enlightened eugenists appeared to be able to find little comfort in his views.

But Professor Darwin said his objection to mate selection would disappear if "by some method less cruel than that of natural selection the inferior stocks could be made to multiply less quickly than the superior."

JAVA MONKEY UPSETS CITY

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 4.—The second knockout within a week was suffered by a Java monkey, which ran amuck in the residence section of Spokane a short time ago, when after a second escape it was cornered in a kitchen and knocked cold at the end of an exciting chase by city firemen and a crowd of citizens.

Police and fire calls were turned in by frightened residents when the monkey broke from the cage of his first captor, and made a flying escape via trees, telephone poles, telephone wires, and house tops. Firemen came with ropes and ladders, chasing the jungle animal into a garret window and from there thru the house to the kitchen. Here it was cornered, but fought until knocked out by a blow over the head. It was necessary to revive it with a pail of cold water.

Now the monkey is making his home at No. 6 fire station, the pride and mascot of the fighters, still waiting to be claimed by its original owner.

Professor Darwin is a son of the great Charles Darwin, and it is natural that he should hold strong views on the survival of the fittest and how this best can be accomplished. He says that the misguided efforts of many sincere and earnest social reformers really result in encouraging the continuance of race inferiority and deterioration, which is just the reverse of what they are trying to do. In a recent speech before the Eugene Education Society, of which he is president, he dwelt upon the harm he thought social reformers were doing.

"Mate Selection" was the title of Professor Darwin's address. He was not sure that mate selection, in the present state of society, was good for the future of the race, and argued that when the fit married the fit they intended to have smaller families, while the inferior people continued producing unfit types which became more marked.

"To secure human progress," he said, "the inferior types must be eliminated, and all that should be demanded is that this process be made as little painful as possible." Pity

Royal Coffin Cruised the Seas While William Lived at Doorn.

BREMEN, Aug. 3.—Back in the old day when William Hohenzollern now living quietly in Holland, used to enjoy traveling about Europe as the German emperor, the steamer Bremen often saw him installed in the imperial suite, built gaudily for his personal use. And at that time it was related, though never proved, that a sumptuous royal coffin was always carried on this vessel, in case of eventualities.

It now appears this story was true. The Bremen is today the Constantinople, running between Sandy Hook

and the Golden Horn. Down in her hold there was found recently the coffin referred to. It is a pretentious affair, lined with silk and decorated with gold and silver. William last travelled on the Constantinople in 1912.

Ex-Officer is Accused.

MEDFORD, Or., Aug. 4.—L. R. Bean, well known citizen of Medford, reported to District Attorney Morre today that he had been halted by Clay Walker, Medford ex-policeman, in the Dead Indian country Saturday, June 21, and his automobile searched for liquor. Bean alleged that Walker was wearing a star at the time, and that he was under the impression stripped from the erstwhile sleuth by Governor Pierce.

Bean's object in visiting the district attorney was to procure the filing of charges against Walker of "impersonating an officer." That official has the matter under advisement.

The records in the appointment of Walker as "a special state agent" show that he received a star July 16 from the governor, and that it was revoked two days later upon the protest of Jackson county citizens.

Warrenton To Get Aid.

WARRENTON, Or., August 4.—Senator Charles L. McNary has sent to the Chamber of Commerce here a telegram denying a report pre-

viously published that he had told members of his touring party here that the unwritten but respected rule in congress was to appropriate no money for harbors within 30 miles of another adequate harbor, provided no natural barrier existed between the proposed site and the other harbor.

The senator says in his telegram: "Am advised that local rumors exist that I stated a rule exists in congress not to improve harbor if within 30 miles of another adequate harbor. The report is entirely unfounded, that situation being put forth some time ago as an argument against harbor improvements. Warrenton's location and commerce justify harbor improvements and as a member of commerce committee I intend actively to do everything that I can persuade the government to assist in deepening and widening Skipanon channel."

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Aug. 4.—Extension to August 29 of the contract of Robert E. Strahorn with the city of Klamath Falls for construction of the Oregon, California & Eastern railway to Sprague river was granted by the council last night. The railway is advertising that stock shipments will be received at Sprague river in August, indicating that the line will be completed to that point within the next month.
