**British Build Powerful New Aeroplane Engine.**

LONDON, Aug. 9.—A giant aeroplane engine of six cylinders, each developing more than 250 horsepower, is now being built for Britain's latest air bombers.

It will be the most formidable aero engine in existence, and it is computed that it will give the planes to which it is fitted a speed of anything up to 160 miles per hour.

**CHICAGO HAS  
HEAVY AUTO  
DEATH TOLL**

CHICAGO, Aug. 9.—With Chicago's death toll from automobiles since January 1 climbing to the 400 mark, as against 250 this time last year, authorities and private citizens are preparing to take drastic steps to curb the speeding motorists whose flying cars leave death and injury in their wake.

A considerable number of the victims are children of tender years and, according to the city and county authorities, unless something is done to curb the speed mania which seems to have gripped a certain portion of Chicago's motorists the death toll for the year will be terrific.

In addition to those killed hundreds of others have been maimed, and scarcely a day passes that does not record a new list of victims ranging in number from one to six.

Disgusted at the apparent helplessness of authorities to handle the situation, citizens in some sections of Chicago are organizing themselves into vigilance committees with the avowed purpose of taking the matter into their own hands and seeing that the streets are made safe for their children.

Declaring that "it is the rich people of Chicago who are neglecting the speed problem," Mrs. Joseph Pihl, prominent clubwoman, has launched a campaign among clubwomen to demand the enforcement of speed penalties, the prosecution of speed violators, and to report all violations of speed laws coming under their observation.

"The rich children have governesses and tutors and housemaids to look after them in the streets, if they ever walk," she declared. "They usually go about in limousines, but the poor little child must dodge to cross a boulevard."

The arrest slip by which officers leave a speeder a summons to court, is a farce, according to Judge Walker, of the Speedway court. In most cases, he said, the arrested speeder gives a false name and address and never appears in court. In other cases, he said, merely fines do not seem to act as a deterrent.
