FOREIGN DEMAND IS VERY LIGHT

Wheat Stagnant on Market Does not Affect the Price of Bread.

LONDON, Aug. 9.—A glut of home-grown wheat threatens to remove Europe from the American export markets when the present crops are harvested.

Already reports indicate that importation of food stuffs into Europe from America is rapidly declining, and there are indications that the harvests will find Europe not only unwilling to buy American wheat but, on the contrary, competing with America in the sale of wheat.

On top of reports of bumper crops in the United States and Canada, with rapidly dropping prices, come reports of heavy crops throughout Europe.

Canada probably will have the edge over the United States in the English market, for already the Canadian Government has sent a Commission to England to endeavor to find means of disposing of the Canadian wheat surplus without too heavy losses to the farmers.

Russia threatens to come back into the world wheat market this year. An official report of recent date estimates the surplus grain output of the Ukraine this year at 500 million pounds, or 100 million bushels. The total area sown is 43 million acres, against a pre-war total of 59 million acres. The total arable acreage of the Ukraine is 95 million.

Reports from Central Europe state that the grain crops are most favorable. The Minister of Agriculture for Poland announces that the crop is unusually good.

Rumania, Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia also report a huge production owing to the heat.

The finest grain crop of recent years is reported for North Africa from Algeria. The total estimate is 150 million bushels, of which 75 million are wheat. It is expected that there will be at least 12 million bushels for export.

The early harvest outlook is favorable for Europe, to a degree, but unfavorable for the American farmer who looks to European markets.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Aug. 9.—With flour and wheat quoted at the lowest prices in more than ten years, Syracuse bakers and grocers announce here can be no early reduction in the retail price of flour or of bread.

Many of the grocers and bakers are clearing profits ranging from 30 to 70 per cent on the price of the flour delivered to their doors, it is declared by investigators.

Flour is now being sold by wholesale grocers and millers in small lots at \$1.75 a barrel less than prices at this time last year.

The higher grades of flour are selling in barrel lots at from \$7 to \$7.50 a barrel. Larger grocery and bakery concerns which buy by the carload get flour cheaper.

One cut-rate grocery store announced its retail price on a standard brand high-grade flour in 25 cents a 12 1/2 pound sack, or a trifle more than \$9.36 a barrel.

Officials of this firm would not say what they are paying, but declared there has been no recent reduction in wholesale prices.

Bakers can buy the highest grade of flour at \$7.50 a barrel even if they buy only in barrel lots, it is read at from 9 to 11 cents a pound out, which gives a return of \$19.60 to \$21.50 on the barrel of flour which was delivered to the door of their plant at from \$5.50 to \$7.50 a barrel.

Pillsbury Milling Company officials admitted there has been a steady reduction in flour and wheat prices for months. They say their prices dropped an average of 25 cents a barrel each Monday and \$1.75 a barrel since last year.

GREETING SENT K. C. MEETING

MONTREAL, Quebec, President Coolidge's message to the annual convention of the supreme council of the Knights of Columbus read here provoked the applause of the 250 delegates from the United States and Canadian provinces, so that they cheered themselves hoarse. It was understood to be the first greeting to any fraternal order by the new president.

Mr. Coolidge said: "The Knights of Columbus is in every sense of the word a patriotic order. You have established great war charities, you have helped to fill the national treasury with your contributions to the various Liberty bonds and you have sent your dearest and best to bear the heat and brunt of battle."

"Your men have served nobly and well in the army and the navy. Your order has ever shown its steadfast devotion to American principles and American ideals."

"You are Knights of Columbus—name of great significance, represent not only a great discovery, but the eternal principle of all discovery and progress."

"When all the world doubted, when his own followers sought to turn back, he called on daring to follow the truth."

"There is no finer knighthood. In

it your noble order stands, resisting all evil counsel, supporting every patriotic cause, following the truth at every hazard, exemplifying anew the eternal principle that the truth shall make you free."

Official Notice

To the Citizens of La Grande: We regret to inform the people of the City of La Grande that we are today, August 9th, 1923, forced to pump water from the river into the City mains to keep up our supply. The capacity of our pipe line leading from Beaver Creek to the City is such that it will not carry the amount of water required for our use during the summer months.

It is our earnest desire that the people of the City of La Grande co-operate with us to the fullest extent so that we may finish up the season without being compelled to drink river water for more than a period of perhaps one or two days, (or sufficient time to fill the reservoir). To that end we are going to ask that the people refrain from irrigating for this evening, August 9th, and the entire day of August 10th, and we also ask that beginning on August 11th those parties whose homes are numbered odd numbers will irrigate on odd days and those numbered even numbers will irrigate on even days. It is our belief that if the people co-operate with us in this way that we can finish the season without any great water shortage.

MALARIA AS A PARALYSIS CURE

Vienna Expert Coming to this Country to Talk on Subject to Physicians.

VIENNA, Aug. 9.—Dr. Franz Erber, one of the best known medical authorities of the University of Vienna, is on the way to America, where he will give lectures before the Rockefeller Institute. Just before his departure he told the International News Service correspondent:

"I understand that the news of Professor Wagner-Jauregg's malaria therapy in treating paralysis has awakened much interest in the United States. I shall touch upon this method in my lectures in America. In all cases that I have personally observed professor Wagner's treatment has registered remarkable success."

"I believe that the extension of the fever-therapy holds the key to mankind's delivery from paralysis. Such extension is absolutely necessary, because it is, after all, a risky proposition to free a human being from one deadly disease by imbuing him with another, which may result in even greater and longer suffering than was caused by the first disease."

"My own experience in Albania during the war taught me that the effect of quinine against malaria is not so sweeping that one can speak of an absolutely certain cure. Indeed, this quinine had no effect whatever in cases of tropical forms of malaria."

"My faith in quinine as a 'specific' has been badly shattered by my observations in the cases of many soldiers suffering of war malaria who were still suffering from that disease after five years of treatment. I have considerable misgivings with regard to the use of malaria therapy in paralysis cases in such malarial regions where the anopheles fly acts as the spreading medium. This applies especially to certain American climates in regions that are on and geographical level of Naples."
