AMERICAN PROHIBITION IS TWISTED

London Gets Queer Stories About the Way America's Dry Law Works.

LONDON, Aug. 9.—The misinformation that England gets about American prohibition would fill a book a day.

England is interested in American prohibition, chiefly in its failure, for England regards this as an experiment which may be extended to this country, if it succeeds. Therefore everyone who has been to America, or who has as much as had a letter from America that derides prohibition, can get a long and enthusiastic hearing in England.

Lord Astor charges that the English liquor trade is behind a strong anti-American propaganda, but certainly the English liquor trade has no measure of control over American statesmen, near-statesmen and semi-statesmen who come to Europe and publicly announce that prohibition is a failure. The English public eats up the words of these individuals, however, and cries for more. The "more" seems to come on every boat that docks.

English newspapers publish in great detail the operations of American bootleggers, in fact some papers publish hardly any other American news except the bootleggers news. Occasionally some self-appointed expert sits himself down to write an authoritative piece on the situation for the consumption of the English reading public.

Sir A. Maurice Low, Washington correspondent of the Morning Post, a die-hard organ, has recently written a series of articles on prohibition, in which he informs the English that prohibition has been "seized upon by the dishonest, the selfish, and the hypocritical who in the name of prohibition are serving their own unworthy ambitions."

CRIPPLED FOLK ENJOY OUTING

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 9.—(AP).—Though in the wintery little group are two children figures held motionless by plaster casts, and another confined by helpless limbs to his wheel chair, eight crippled children of this city are enjoying a vacation and outing at Twin Lakes this week, as guests of the American Association of University Women.

One of the two in plaster casts has been promised, much to her delight, that the cast will be removed for just a little while and that she may lie down in the shallow water, and make believe "swim" like other little children do. The kiddies are wards of the Spokane Rotary club crippled children's committee.

One of the mothers taken with the kiddies said that it was the first vacation she had had in 40 years, and the first time in her life since she was old enough to cook for herself, that any one had cooked a meal for her.

STRANGE HONOR CODE IN PRISON

Walla Walla Penitentiary Develops a Very New Set of Rules.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 9.—(A. P.)—The story of a strange honor code is being told here, following the recapture of Mike Donnelly, several years ago a red-shirt man at the state penitentiary. Donnelly was taken recently by an Idaho posse, which scoured the hills for weeks following his alleged fatal shooting of W. A. Crisp, pool hall proprietor of Hope, Idaho.

Donnelly was sent up for life in 1911, according to Detective Chester Edwards, who tells the story, and some years after that, with two thrilling escapes to his credit, the negro

prisoner was wearing a red shirt to signify that he was a bad prisoner. Warden Henry Drum summoned him to the office.

"Mike, he said, 'I've decided to make a trusty out of you. I'm going to put you on the outside gate. You'll have every chance in the world to escape from there if you wish to betray my confidence.'"

Donnelly hesitated not a second, according to Detective Edwards.

"Warden, don't tempt me," he answered, according to Detective Edwards. "I'm going to escape from this prison the first chance I get but I don't want to go that way."

"Donnelly went back to his work in the jute mill and a narrow call with chances of escape slim, when he might have had a soft trusty's job and the way to freedom open, all because he wouldn't break his word," the detective commented. "Crooks are strange creatures. Donnelly would kill a man in cold blood, but he wouldn't break his word to the warden."

Frank Comment on Ruhr.

LONDON, July 24. (By Mail).—London has heard some frank comment recently on the situation in the Ruhr.

J. Thomas, the Labor leader, said recently at Shrewsbury: "It appears we are at the parting of the ways in European affairs, so far as France is concerned. No one wants to excuse Germany for her misdeeds, but we should say to France that the only solution of the present state of affairs is to get together, talk things over frankly, and watch the future with a desire to forget the past. We cannot stand by and allow the continuance of a policy which is ruinous to France as well as to Germany and can but lead to disaster for ourselves."
