Mr. and Mrs. John Bane of Walla Walla arrived in La Grande yesterday.

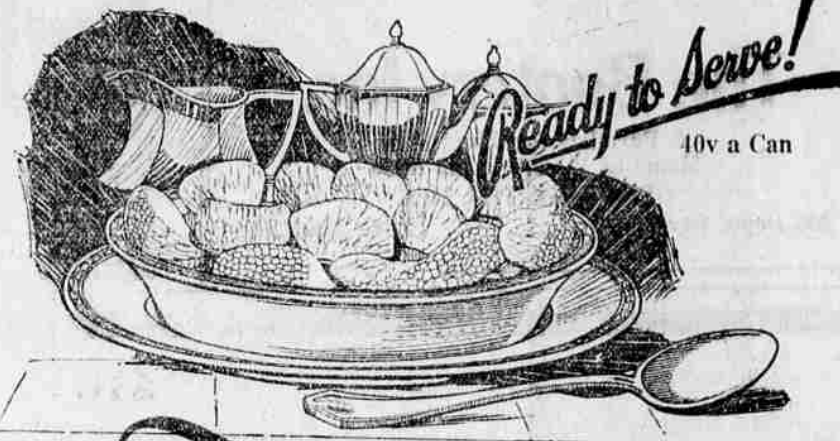

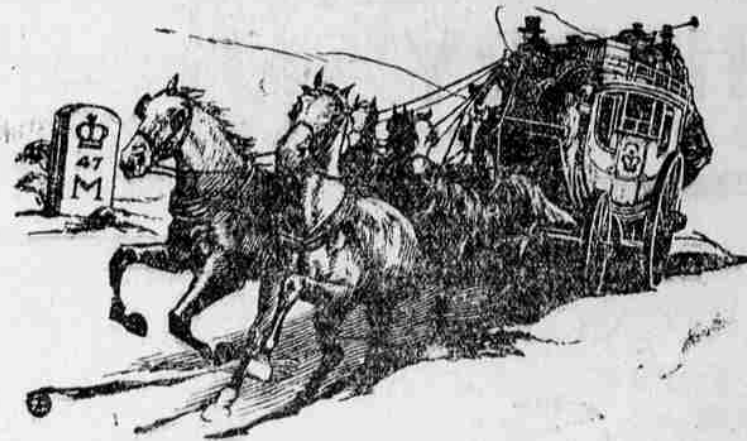
