## PENDLETON WILL BE SHRINE HOST

PENDLETON, Aug. 17.—Shriners, thousands strong, will be in Pendleton for their big "Wild West" ceremonial on Wednesday, September 19, according to arrangements completed between the Round-Up association and Hal T. Hutchinson, Imperial potentate of Al Kador temple.

There are possibilities that the delegation will be great for the enthusiasm regarding the ceremonial is as vast as the fabled "hot sands." And to show their interest in Pendleton the Shriners are adding a \$200 prize saddle to the prize list. The saddle will go to the winner of the girls' relay race. The beautiful trophy will establish a precedent, for never before has a saddle been given as a prize in this event on the first day. Three special trains will bring the Shriners to Pendleton, with the possibility of a fourth being added to the number. They will arrive at 7:30 a. m. and will be met by local Shriners. Included in the party will be the famous chapters, band and patrol. The entire Shrine delegation will march in a mammoth street parade at 1 p. m. It will form at the train and wind through Pendleton streets.

At the close of the parade the Shriners will hold their ceremonial at Happy Canyon. It will close at 5 p. m. giving the visitors ample time to be ready for the Happy Canyon show Wednesday evening. They will attend the Round-Up in a body on Thursday and it is a probability that one special train will remain for all three days. Included among the visitors will be 40 Tacoma Shriners, a big delegation from Spokane and another from Boise. Potentate Hutchinson has indicated that there is every reason to believe that Shriners will like the Pendleton meeting so well that the ceremonial will be an annual affair.

Local Shriners are having no stone thrown in making plans for the affair. At a meeting of the local Shrine club last evening, James H. Sturges was chosen president, Robert Simpson vice president and Mark Barthel secretary-treasurer. Under their direction arrangements to give the Shriners a truly western welcome are being forward. They are meeting with the hearty cooperation of all local members. Three stage coaches and a mounted patrol, in cowboy costume, will meet the specials.

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## Gulls to Wage Insect Battle

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Aug. 17.—There is a plague of grasshoppers in the vicinity of Kaysville, Flathurst county, Montana, and authorities of that town have written to officials here asking if it is possible to procure a lot of young seagulls from Great Salt Lake to do away with the pests. Flathurst county is said to possess ideal feeding and nesting grounds for the birds.

Seagulls are scarce in Utah. They come in numbers, annually from the Pacific Ocean to nest on the six islands in the lake.

In plowback days, when the settlers were about to harvest their first crops in the Great Salt Lake Valley there came a scourge of grasshoppers which the seagulls devoured. Hence the birds are under state protection. On the Mormon Temple block there is a large monument erected to them.

Whether Kaysville will get seagulls from Utah or not is a question for the state fish and game department to decide.

## Ancient Spear in Whale Body

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Aug. 17.—A harpoon believed to be over a century old was found in the body of a sixty-ton whale killed off Humboldt county, California, recently.
