It was left a mangled mass of twisted girders and crazily tilted ledges, and has remained in this undignified position since that time. Last New Year's Eve a great party was prepared at Babylon and all San Francisco was invited to attend. However, counter attractions that did not call for the crossing of any wind swept marshes cut down the attendance to a few hundred.

The distressed proprietor who had prepared for 1,000 or more, concluded the party as quickly as possible, turned out the lights, locked the door and went his way.

A real estate research party in the ruins of Babylon a few months later found things just as they had been left at the end of the New Year's celebration. The tables remained cluttered with dishes, dust of them half-filled with food. Dust covered paper serpentine, confetti, equally dust-covered, formed a crazy quilt over the floor, and tin horns and other noise makers remained where they had been flung away in the abandon of the hour.

The history of the Ohio building goes no further than this.

The other buildings have all gone, with the exception of the Palace of Fine Arts. The Oregon building, a tremendous log affair, was left until it sagged dangerously every time a crowd entered it, and then it was torn down. One monument, the Column of Progress, remains, but it, too, is crumbling away.

BOY COVERS 3,500 MILES; SPENDS \$16

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 18.—Covering some 3,500 miles in 16 days at a total expense of \$16, Richard Gordon, Spokane boy, reports an interesting "hitch-hike" from Des Moines, Iowa, to New York and back again.

Young Gordon, a student of osteopathy at Des Moines, and another student, set out June 1 for the national convention of osteopaths in New York. Their hiking suits were labelled, "Des Moines to New York. Thanks. We are still here."

"We were picked up and given auto rides along the route and in some cases rode 400 miles in one car," Gordon said upon his return. "We made it to New York together in eight days, and then I 'hitch-hiked' back alone, in the same length of time."

Gasoline Stocks Increase.
NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—Gasoline stock held at refineries were drawn on to the extent of 1,203,119 barrels during July, according to reports made to the American Petroleum Institute. Stocks east of the Rockies increased 7,387,000 barrels in July.

The daily average gross crude oil production of the United States increased 10,200 barrels during the week ended August 11, totaling 2,261,250 barrels. The daily average production east of the Rocky mountains was 1,379,250 barrels, a decrease of 10,650 barrels. California production was 872,000 barrels, an increase of 21,000.

Mark Collapse Hits Japanese

HONOLULU, T. H., Aug. 18.—Collapse of the German mark has been felt in Hawaii more keenly by the Japanese than by any other of the numerous races represented here, according to local bankers, who said that many thousands of dollars have been lost by Japanese in the purchase of marks at apparent " bargain" prices.

When the mark began its sensational slump the Japanese rushed into the market and purchased the exchange in large quantities. The bankers said they expressed belief in the economic future of Germany and refused to consider the possibility of further declines.

Even now, it is said to be extremely difficult to dissuade some of the Japanese from purchasing more marks.

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Phillipine Sea Life Is Potential Food Supply

MANILA, Aug. 17.—Fish that climb trees, fish that live on land and drown in water, full-grown fish so small that 10,000 of them make a light breakfast for the natives who catch them, and fish whose scales hatch and bring up the young are among the strange and rare varieties of the fishy tribe that inhabit Philippine waters described by Dr. Albert Herre, fish expert of the Philippine Bureau of Science, before the American Chamber of Commerce recently.

What is considered by scientists the most unique fish in existence is the so-called shrimp fish found in Philippine waters. It is perfectly transparent, its skin being like celluloid, and its fins are placed where its head and tail should be.

Sharks are found in abundance in Philippine waters, the tiger shark, of man-eating variety, inhabiting Manila Bay. Sharks 70 feet long and thick in proportion, are caught in the southern islands. Very few people know that most of the world's commercial cod liver oil is really shark liver oil. It has also been recently discovered that the liver of the Philippine shark will yield a substance used to manufacture the new diabetes cure, insulin.

Curry Electric Shock.
Ray fish that give an electric shock are common in Philippine waters. A saw-fish, 22 feet long, was caught in Cebu recently. It uses its long saw to kill small fish, which it attacks while they swim about in schools.

Giant barracuda, six feet and more in length, swim about in Philippine waters, and are more dangerous to man than the shark. The barracuda is the greatest Philippine fish and puts up royal battles against expert fishermen. There are also plenty of pompano and lap-lap of enormous size.

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The Smallest Fish.
The smallest fish known to science is the ipon, found only in Lake Bu in the Philippine province of Cebu. It reaches a length of a quarter of an inch when full grown. At the same time some of the largest whales ever seen have come ashore in Philippine waters, particularly in the vicinity of Cebu.

All in all, there are some 1,500 varieties of fish in the Philippine archipelago, many of them of great commercial value, but no one has as yet developed the fishing industry here on a commercial scale. Some attempt have been made, but none have been successful, largely because of the fact that the persons undertaking business have not had the necessary practical experience. The fishes

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
