## CONDUCT AUTO SAFETY MEET

### Contests to Be Held in Indianapolis with View of Reducing Deaths.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 20.—Fewer lives to the mile, not more miles to the gallon or more miles to the minute, is the goal of an automobile driving contest being held by the Indianapolis police department.

Appalled by the terrific toll of automobile accidents in Indiana, Captain Michael Glenn, head of the police traffic division, hit upon the contest plan to stimulate interest in safe driving. In order to test the theory that women drivers cause a large part of the accidents, the contest was limited to women.

The entrants will be required to drive over a test course through the business district with police judges riding with them. The manner in which they handle their automobiles in traffic, cross railroad tracks, avoid reckless pedestrians and observe the city traffic rules will be scored by points.

Preliminary contests began August 6 to narrow the field of scores of entrants down to ten. These ten will meet in the final contest later in the month. Cash prizes have been offered for the winners by an Indianapolis newspaper and other awards by the Hoopier Motor Club.

There have been speed, endurance and economy automobile tests, said Captain Glenn, but the most essential thing in motoring, safe driving, has apparently been overlooked. The result is that while we get many miles to the hour, and many miles to the gallon, our consumption of lives to the mile remains entirely too high.

A safe walking contest for pedestrians should be held after the safe driving contest is completed. In the opinion of Captain Glenn.

## BIRDMEN TO VIEW KAULA MYSTERIES

(By E. N. S.) HONOLULU, Aug. 20.—United States birdmen attached to Army Flying Headquarters at Luke Field here are about to launch an aerial expedition which is expected to solve the mysteries of Kaula, the mighty rock which rears its head hundreds of feet above the Pacific some 60 miles south and west of Kaula and Nihaou, of the Hawaiian group.

Plans for the experiment—which will be in the nature of photographic flights, with their base on Kaula, the "Garden Island"—were announced by army authorities recently. Kaula, a rock of tremendous bulk, lifts a sheer series of cliffs on one side, while on the other an extremely heavy sort rolls in. It is said that but one living being has ever been able to effect a landing on the rock. A Hawaiian fisherman, according to the story, paddled with friends in an outrigger canoe to near the rock, leaped into a huge breaker and body-surfed ashore. How he left the tiny island is not told.

The object of the Air Service expedition will be to photograph the island from all angles in an endeavor to find from the resulting pictures, a landing spot.

Three air officers visited Kaula, and selected suitable bases for both land and sea craft.

## TRACTOR SHOW OPENS MONDAY

The National Power and Tractor Show under the auspices of the Ford Motor company, the Ford Dealers of Portland and sixty nationally known manufacturers of power equipment will open in the specially selected show grounds at East 16th Street and Flanders Street, Portland, on Monday, August 20th.

The exposition will be housed under three huge tents, each 75 feet by 125 feet and included in the show will be a free motion picture exhibit open to the public and showing the largest collection of industrial and agricultural power pictures ever exhibited in the Northwest.

The show will open with a huge street parade on Monday, the lead tractor being driven by Margaret Woodruff, who will pilot the huge trailer on which will ride the band.

Many novelty features are promised for this parade in addition to the interesting display of tractors hauling huge industrial machinery through the downtown streets. There will be a Ford car of the vintage of 1903, motoring days which are dim in the recollection of most of those who will watch the procession of power.

Directly following the parade, the

demonstrations at the show grounds will be opened by Mayor George L. Baker.

Arrangements have been completed so that every piece of power in the many exhibits at the show will be ready to do their work when the Mayor gives the signal to go ahead.

One day each week has been set aside for the dealers and general public of each district of the state, which is as follows:

Monday, August 20th, Portland and vicinity.

Tuesday, August 31st, Willamette Valley.

Wednesday, August 22nd, Lower Columbia counties.

Thursday, August 23rd, Southern Oregon.

Friday, August 24th, Central Oregon.

Saturday, August 25th, Eastern Oregon.

There will be saw mills, compressed air drills, miniature railroads, hoists and other machinery of this nature vying with new forms of plows, threshers and agricultural equipment for the interest of the spectators. There will be trailers capable of hauling great loads of logs, and delivery outfits which will meet the demands of the corner grocer.

All of these will be demonstrated and shown through their places all during the day for the entire week.

The total value of the exhibits is in the vicinity of a million dollars and as this exposition has been arranged for Portland, it will be the largest which has ever been shown in the Northwest or anywhere along the coast.

## Carnation Home Cooking Lessons

### Lesson No. 4

### Pies "Like His Mother Used to Make"

PIE has been called the great American dessert, and to be able to construct a good pie is one of the supreme tests of a cook.

The first essential of any pie is a flaky, tender crust—the kind that will fairly "melt in your mouth." One of the secrets of this is to have your ingredients as cold as possible when they are mixed; another is to avoid handling the pastry dough more than is absolutely necessary.

There are many kinds of fillings that can be used for making pies. Fruit, mince-meat and similar fillings are usually in convenient form and require little special preparation. In this lesson I will give you some excellent recipes for more complicated pies.

#### Pie Crust

2 cup flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup shortening, cold water to moisten. Sift salt with flour. Cut shortening into flour with a knife or work in quickly with tips of fingers. Use enough cold water to make the particles of the mixture adhere together. Turn on a lightly floured board and roll thin, handling as little as possible. This recipe makes one pie crust.

#### Cocoanut Pie

2 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup flour, 1/4 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 1 1/2 cups water, 1/2 cup cocoanut, 1/2 cup Carnation Milk.

Scald the milk in double boiler. Mix the flour with a little cold water, and add to scalded milk. Cook until it thickens; add sugar, salt and yolks of eggs well beaten, then add to mixture and cook for two minutes. Add vanilla and cocoanut. Add to baked pie crust. Beat the whites of eggs stiff, add 1 tablespoon of sugar and put on top of the pie. Set in oven long enough to brown on top. This recipe makes one pie.

#### Custard Pie

2 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3 tablespoons sugar, 1 cup water, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 cup Carnation Milk, few grains nutmeg.

Beat eggs slightly, add sugar, salt and milk. Line a pie tin with pie paste; add the mixture to which the vanilla has been added. Sprinkle the top with nutmeg. Bake in hot oven at first.
