### HUMAN EMBRYO IS LIKE FROG

#### Syracuse Professor Displays Evidence Which Seems to Support Evolution.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Aug. 22.—Darwin was right, in spite of William Jennings Bryan and prominent church persons who fear that acceptance of the scientist's theory will challenge religion's foundations, experiments at Syracuse University seem to show.

If anyone doubts that the human embryo clearly shows all marks which later change to ears, or a tail which is later absorbed before birth, let him call on Professor William M. Smallwood, of the department of biology, at the local university, and he will show some startling specimens.

In the first stage of formation the embryonic heart of a human can hardly be distinguished from that of a frog. Its shape and functioning are almost identical. The radical change comes later. Another organ which appears to strengthen the evolution theory is the kidney. At first, in the human embryo, it resembles that of a fish, then a reptile and then a frog.

Professor Smallwood produces organs, tissues, nerves and artery systems to show exactly how the various phyla in the animal kingdom developed as they were thrown against new conditions in their fight for existence. It was the survival of the fittest, and the animals were forced to adapt themselves to demands of life or die.

Man did not ascend from the monkey, as some people believe the Darwinian theory attempts to prove. Professor Smallwood points out, Darwin simply wished to show that man went through the same struggle to survive and in doing so developed the highly perfected body he now has.

Man and monkey may have come from a closely allied source, but at no time were those sources identical, says Professor Smallwood. Evolutionists do not seek to destroy the theory of the creation. Rather they believe their discoveries will strengthen this theory, he declares.

Life Owe To Watch.  
DAYTON, O., Aug. 22.—A watch carried in the hip pocket of a pair of overalls probably saved the life of Peter Swanson Friday night, when he was kicked by one of his horses. Mr. Swanson, who operates a small farm

just south of town, was watering his team. One of the animals became enraged at another horse and kicked violently with both feet, one of which struck Mr. Swanson in the breast and stomach.

The watch received the main force of the blow, which was so great that an imprint of the hoof as deep as half the width of a lead pencil was made in the back of the case. Mr. Swanson will be able to continue his work this week.
