From Crusts and Crumbs BY BETTY CROCKER EGGS AND TOAST IN A NEW WAY. Cracked Eggs: On Toast 2 eggs flour 1/2 tsp salt 2 drops butter 2 hard boiled 1 1/2 cups milk eggs 1/2 cup grains Toast pepper. Blend butter and flour, put over fire and stir until melted, add milk, pepper, and salt. Stir continually until thick. Separate whites and yolks of hard boiled eggs. Chop the whites fine and add to sauce. Arrange pieces of toast on a platter, pour the sauce over them, and lay the yolks through a ricer onto the toast and dressing. Serve hot.
