(Continued From Page One) bewildering economic condition of getting less for his goods than it cost to produce them, yet seeing the same goods, with other products of the country, steadily mounting in price month after month, until there is a nation-wide protest on the part of the consumer. Mr. Spence thinks there must be a lessening of this big expansion between the producer and consumer. He thinks that strong unions of producers and consumers can cut out the middle profits and expenses and save these for both organizations by taking many products almost direct from the grower to the retailer. He believes that the only remedy in sight for wheat growers is in control of the product, control of selling, and regulation of the market. If the wheat growers had half the control organization of their product that the business combinations of the nation have over them, they would not be producing for less than cost," he declares. "Under the present system farmers have got to combine and play the national game for their own existence. They have got to control their goods and fix their selling price, otherwise millions of farmers will leave their farms and go to the cities, and then we will have other serious conditions to confront us."

ADMITS OFFICERS TRICK CRIMINALS

PHILADELPHIA, U. S. S.—Tactful admission that trickery is sometimes resorted to by officers of the law to obtain evidence was made recently by Federal Judge Dickinson in the United States District Court here during a prohibition case. Benjamin Golden, counsel for a liquor dealer, sought to squish a search warrant issued against his client's premises by excluding certain evidence he contended was obtained by unethic methods. "It may be unethical and bad morals," Judge Dickinson said, "but it is not bad law. No one would doubt the morals of authorities who put a man in a cell with another in order to beguile him into making a confession, but the practice is permitted and evidence thus secured is used to secure conviction of the defendant. Maybe there is a need for a rule to exclude such evidence, but there is none now."

WEIGHTS AND MEASURES ASSOCIATION TO MEET

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (U. S. S.)—The New Jersey Weights and Measures association will hold its twelfth annual conference at the Hotel St. Charles here September 5, 6, 7 and 8. These meetings, formerly closed, will be open to manufacturers of weighing and measuring machines this time. Federal authorities of the Bureau of Standards at

Washington and weights and measures officials of states near New Jersey are expected to attend.

Meeker Visits Pocatello POCATELLO, Ida. (AP)—Eera Meeker, pioneer of the Old Oregon trail, arrived in Pocatello Tuesday from New York and will remain here for several days.

Mr. Meeker is the only man now living who, as an adult, participated in founding the commonwealth known as the state of Washington. He is 93 years of age and is looking well and hearty. He made his first trip over the Oregon trail in 1852 and crossed with ox teams in 1866, 1897, 1910 and 1911, erecting granite monuments to preserve the memory of the pioneers who traversed the trail.

Mr. Meeker is engaged in promoting an organization known as the Pioneer of America.

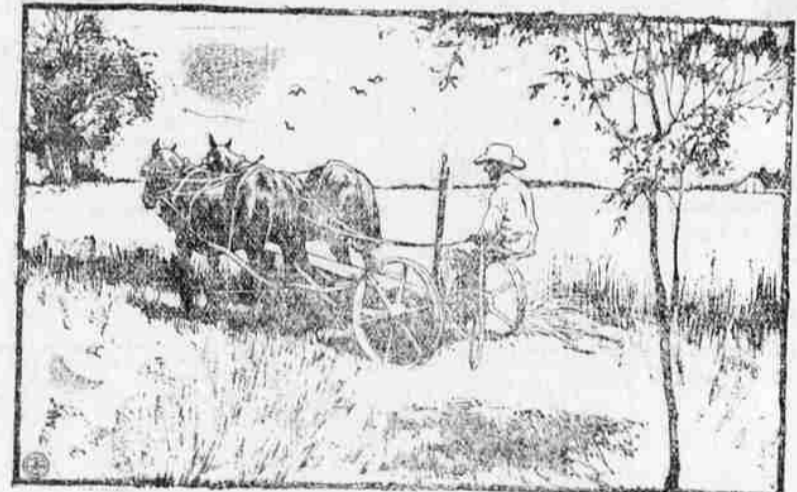
