Escape from "Island of Ships" in Submarine.

One of the most exciting of the thrilling episodes abounding in "The Isle of Lost Ships," now playing at the Star Theatre, centers about a submarine, and Director Maurice Tourneur has injected into it tense and gripping drama.

The locale of the story, which was written by Capt. Crittenden Marriott, is in the Sargasso Sea, a tract in the North Atlantic in which, sailors declare, thousands of vessels of all era have been sucked and where the survivors have formed a colony.

Into this strange "isle of ships" the bulk of an ocean liner is drawn. On it are three persons, a society girl, a New York detective, and his prisoner, a former naval officer, under sentence of death. The ruler of the colony, covers the girl, who is saved from his clutches by the prisoner. Seeking a means of escape from what looked like certain death, they find a submarine which had been abandoned by its crew and has been swept into the vortex by the currents.

Being a former naval officer, the prisoner is able to operate the submarine, and plans are laid to escape in it. They are discovered before they can get away, but manage to find refuge in the boat just as their enemies appear on the scene. Desperately, the pursuers climb aboard the slowly sinking submarine, trying to batter a hole in it before it can gain the depths. As the boat sinks below the level of the water they are washed off and their attempts foiled.

Then started a hazardous journey. As the submarine started to rise to the surface it was held down by the weight of tons of wood, and the detective was shot out of the torpedo tube to cut away the weeds. Startling under-water scenes show him at his dangerous task.

"The Isle of Lost Ships" is a first National attraction and was produced by M. C. Levee, and will be shown at the Star Theatre until Saturday night.

QUEEN'S VISIT TO CLUB STARTS ROW

LONDON, (U. S. S.)—Queen Mary threatens to become a bone of contention in the American Women's Club.

The members of the club, who have recently moved into a new home, received cards a short time ago announcing that on a certain date the clubhouse would be closed for several hours. No explanation was given. It developed later that the clubhouse had been closed in order that Queen Mary might visit and inspect it. Then the storm broke.

One version was that the Queen had expressed a desire to see the clubhouse and had given orders that the club must be cleared of all its members when she came. (Another version was that the officials of the club had made the Queen's visit the occasion for a select little gathering. Some of the democratic members are protesting against being deprived of their club rights for the sake of royalty, others are storming against the officials. The controversy promises to become quite interesting and may lead to a debate on the degree of democracy which Americans should adopt when in England. Some maintain that the closing of the club was most undemocratic.

The Evening Standard comments: "There is something of an amused stir among club women concerning this event, for at this supposed stronghold of republicanism the visit caused more anxiety and more repugnance than it would have done in an Englishwomen's club."

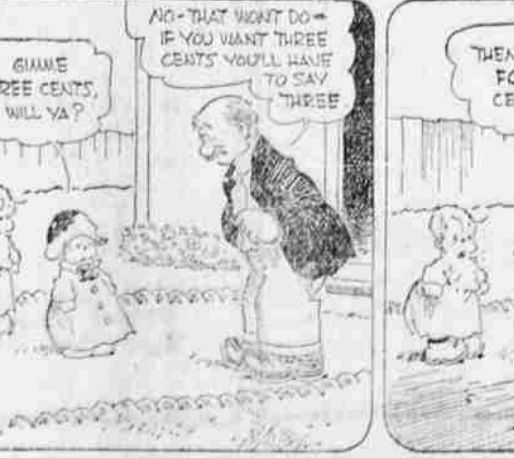
