### BUSINESS AT WALLOWA GOOD

WALLOWA, Ore.—Business is good in Wallowa. A general survey of conditions indicates that business on the whole is 25 per cent better now than at this time last year. Merchandise is moving fast, the hotels are running at about capacity, real estate is active, and other lines prospering. The increase became pronounced in July, and with the taking over of the sawmill by the Bowman-Hicks Co. things took on a considerable increase in the words of the O. W. R. R. & N. Co. report "Business in Wallowa is exceedingly brisk." In comparison Enterprise is listed as (Business normal, with little increase over last year.)

The Bowman-Hicks Lumber Co. gave a raise of forty cents a day for common labor recently, making the wage now \$3.50. This assisted in the general increase of money in circulation. A further acceleration is looked for when the lumber company puts on an extra shift, which is expected soon.

Several business men are planning for the increase with new buildings. Wallowa seems to be on the edge of a boom.

School Authorities Preparing for Opening of City Schools on September 10.

Many of the valley schools will open one week from today—September 5—but the majority will swing into their first semester on September 10, according to Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe, county school superintendent, who also stated: "Everything is now practically in readiness for the opening day and I am sure that this school year will prove to be one of the most successful we have had for several years."

With the opening of the fall and winter semester of school in La Grande but 14 days distant, school authorities are head over heels in a period of activity, preparing everything to that registration, and the actual opening will go ahead with no halts or delays.

Principal E. D. Towler, of the high school, announced today that the staff of teachers was practically complete and that plans for registration, to start September 4 and continue during that week, and work on the schedules, was advancing promisingly. An innovation in registration is also announced—the Senators will this year register in the offices of the principal under his supervision which will do away with any possible mistakes in selecting the final-year students.

### Lesson No. 5 Economical Dishes Easily Prepared

WHERE families are large and incomes not so elastic as might be wished, one of the problems of the homemaker is to serve good, wholesome and tasty dishes that can be prepared at low cost.

Here again, Carnation Milk is an able ally, for it enables her to have at all times an abundant supply of pure, rich milk at a relatively small expense and by using this in her cooking she can make appetizing and nourishing dishes at much less cost than where expensive cuts of meat and ready-prepared delicatessen goods are used.

For lunch or for the evening meal, a cream soup is a satisfying course. Here is one that is easily made and economical.

### Cream of Macaroni Soup

1 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/4 cup macaroni, broken in 1/2 inch pieces, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons flour, 3 cups water, 1 cup Carnation Milk. Cook macaroni in boiling salted water about twenty minutes or until soft. Drain. Melt butter; add flour; add salt; then milk and cook five minutes. Combine with macaroni. This recipe serves six people.

Where there is meat left over from a roast or stew the following recipe will suggest an excellent way of making use of it.

### Scalloped Meat

2 cups meat, parsley, 1 1/2 cups thin white sauce. Chop meat fine and season with salt and pepper if desired. Mix meat and thin white sauce and put in buttered baking dish, cover the top with buttered bread crumbs and brown in oven 10 or 15 minutes. Cold fish may be shredded and used in the same way. This recipe serves six people.

Many of our ancestors, particularly those who lived in the "corn" states, practically raised their families on corn bread and milk—a most nourishing and wholesome food. Here's an easy way to make good corn bread:

### Corn Bread

1/2 cupful flour, 1/2 cupful water, 1 cupful corn meal, 1/2 cupful Carnation Milk, 1 egg, 1/2 tea-

spoonful salt, 2 teaspoonfuls baking powder, 2 table-spoonfuls butter or substitute. Mix flour, corn meal, salt and baking powder. Add unbeaten egg and liquid. Add melted butter and beat vigorously. Pour into shallow pan which has been well oiled and bake in a moderate oven. The mixture must be thin.

An inexpensive substitute for cake—one that always pleases the children and many adults is old-fashioned gingerbread. This recipe is one that I have found most satisfactory:

### Gingerbread

6 table-spoonfuls water, 2 1/2 cupfuls flour, 1 cup molasses, 2 table-spoonfuls Carnation Milk, 1/2 teaspoonful salt, 1/2 teaspoonful soda, 1/4 teaspoonful ginger, 1/4 cupful butter or lard. Sift dry ingredients together. Add liquid to molasses. Combine mixtures, add shortening and beat well. Pour into oiled shallow pan and bake in moderately hot oven about 25 minutes.
