Real R. R. Construction Seen in "The Iron Trail." Realism for Next Rex Beach Picture Secured by Actualities.

For the scene of the big fight at the crossroads, between the rival gangs of workers, so vividly described by Rex Beach in his story, "The Iron Trail," nearly a half mile of the tracks of the Wharton & Northern Railroad were torn up and replaced, and over a quarter of a mile of new roadbed was constructed to interest the main line of the road while the cameras were grinding for this United Artists production.

"The Iron Trail" is one of the most powerful of Rex Beach's stories and the adventures of the hardy builders of the Alaskan railroad, that he describes in it are so vivid that the realism of realism was needed to portray actual camera pictures. It is far short of the requirements of the mighty vastness of the great outdoors so forcefully conveyed in the pages of the book and the scenes had to be actually enacted in all their details.

For the actual railroad construction work nearly two hundred laborers were employed under the supervision of a force of construction engineers and the removal and replacement of the tracks was carried on successfully without interfering with train schedules.

In addition to the actual building of approximately three-quarters of a mile of practical railroad, a block tower had to be especially built and signal equipment installed to safeguard the workers.

Realizing that in every community there are a great number of people familiar with the practical side of railroad construction, the producers of "The Iron Trail" decided that every incident pertaining to the building of the road should be true to life and every scene recorded by the camera is of actual work performed by trained railroad workers.

The introduction of real railroad men, real miners, and actual work in the screen presentation will instill a degree of realism that no amount of stagecraft would have imparted.

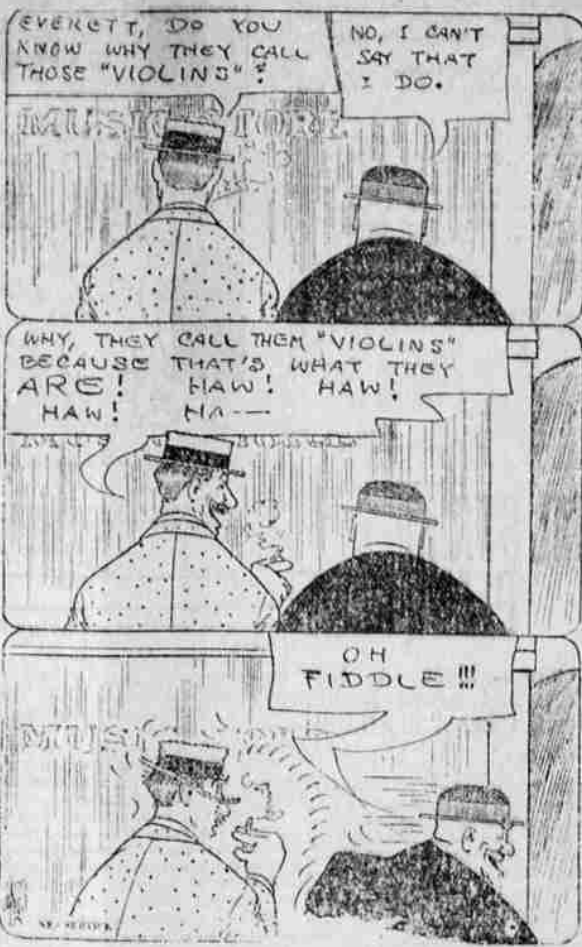

Miles of open country are seen from its roadway and mountainous peaks towering one above the other from a vast vista of wild country.
