Fashion Notes

Ornaments of all varieties, ostrich predominating, will flash prettily on the new fall millinery. Ostrich fashioned in both the formal forms and worked into flowers, leaves, and sprays is used to adorn millinery hats. Extra long burnt peacock comes second in the ranks of the plumage.

Other popular trimmings for the new season include huge bow loop ornaments that are either placed in front or at the right side of the rear of the hats they grace. Trailing trimmings of lace and ribbon streamers abound, and huge flowers of shaded silks are also seen. Bends are used as all-over standing for theater bonnets. An abundance of rhinestone and paste ornaments is displayed, and paddle and fish effects in pins are popular.

Painted and enameled effects are seen applied in all-over effects, and pins are found here and there on fitted shapes in conjunction with plumage trims. Shaving brush carried supplant similar effects in ribbon on the cloches. Large buckles are used to catch in the drapes of levels. Bands of wide embroidered ribbons are noted as a trimming theme in the off-the-face shapes, while in riotous motifs flowers and twists of tinsel ribbon are the thing.

Few of the formal trimmings are placed flat on the hats, but flare up and stick out instead. Jet, gold, and painted celluloid ball-heads are seen as studings on a number of models. Black lace veils outlined in jet beads also play their part in this new season's mode, as do veils formed of several meshes veiled. In self trimmings are seen several twisted ropes of fabrics.

Bar Association To Promote Study of U.S. Constitution

DALLAS, TEX. (A. P.)—Few, if any, residents of the United States will have extensive after September 22, for not having heard something of the history of the Constitution of the United States, or at least have given it some thought, if plans of the Citizenship Committee of the American Bar Association mature.

Starting Sunday, September 16, a period of each day for the week ending September 22, in some part of the United States, will be set aside for meetings at which the Constitution, its history, purposes, and attacks which are made upon it, will be discussed.

The suggested program for the first day of the week includes sermons in churches of all denominations on the text "Remove Not the Ancient Landmarks Which Thy Father Have Set," taken from Proverbs, 22:28.

Monday, September 17, the general subject suggested is "The Setting and Inspiration of the United States Constitution; the Magna Charta, the English Bill of Rights, and Mayflower Compact; Declaration of Independence, and Articles of Confederation." Each will be discussed by speakers on that day, and it will be shown how the older parts led to others and finally to the present constitution.

Wednesday of the Constitution, which are "A Government of Laws and Not of Men; Liberty Under the Law; and Equal Opportunity to All Citizens" is the general subject suggested for Tuesday, September 18.

Speakers on Wednesday, Sept. 19 will discuss the Bill of Rights in the Constitution, and what it has meant to the American people, and what it entailed court and cause, on or before
