BURGLAR TOOLS AN "L. O. U." FOR A REDEEMED LIFE

"Let these be the L. O. U. of 'Slippy McGee'." He handed the priest a small package. It was his burglar's kit—the kit that had just saved a girl's name.

"THAT'S ALASKA." SAYS HEN BEACH

Noted Author Puts Personal Approval On "That Iron Trail" Production

When Hen Beach had his first look at the scenes for the United Artists release, "The Iron Trail," he expressed his approval in two words—"That's Alaska."

It is not so much what one says as how one says it that counts; and the tone of satisfied conviction with which the author uttered those two words spoke volumes of commendation.

The scenes that Mr. Beach saw were those forming the climax of the picture, where the mighty crash of the ice in the river starts to sweep all before it on its rush from the glaciers to the sea. And the scene of the tipping railroad bridge over the Salmon River with the men working desperately to save it from destruction. Other actions of the production showing the action at the railroad crossing where the big mail freight cars, were also shown and while those pieces of film were seen in the rough without taping, titling or any pretense at continuity, Mr. Beach who knows Alaska as probably no other writer does, sat tensely interested and mentally carried back to the land of adventure in the far north.

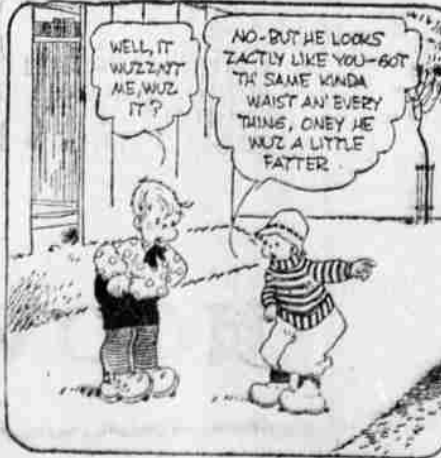
