High Yielding Oat, Smut-Immune, Found In Moro Experiments. MORO OR.—The branch experiment station at Moro in Sherman County announces the discovery of a high yielding oat variety that is immune to smut. This variety, named Carleton, has been carefully tested in experiments at Moro under varying soil and climatic conditions since 1914, and its performance has been consistently satisfactory. Its average yield for a ten-year period has been 53.4 bushels per acre during the period was 22 bushels. In 1923 it produced 86.5 bushels per acre and in 1918 it produced 102.5 bushels per acre. The lowest yield obtained from the Carleton oat was 36.8 bushels per acre in 1918. Seed from Moro was sent to the experiment station at Pullman in trials there it proved to be immune to smut and also a high yielder. The Moro station has a limited quantity of seed available for distribution to farmers of Oregon, interested in growing oats. Miss Snell Passes On. CORVALLIS.—Miss Margaret Snell, pioneer teacher of home economics at O. A. C. died Thursday night at her home in Corvallis, at the age of 78. Miss Snell belonged to a well-known family of educators in Oakland, Cal. Her work at O. A. C. began in 1885, when she taught the first cooking and sewing courses at the college, laying the foundation for the present school of home economics. She was head of the department for 13 years. When she resigned in 1907, the work had been developed to take in many other subjects and 200 young women were registered in her classes. Margaret Snell hall, residence for women students, was named for Miss Snell as a tribute to her service. "What a Grass Widow Knew." is the name of a new book. It ought to be the season's best seller.
