## TRACKMEN READY FOR A. A. U. GAMES FRIDAY

CHICAGO.—America's greatest track athletes, all eager to win recognition for the 1924 Olympics at Paris, are here to take part in the national A. A. U. championship games which open on Stagg Field to-morrow afternoon and continue for three days.

Entries for the big classic have broken all past records and comprise what is probably the greatest collection of track athletes ever seen in this country. Practically all of the national champions are on hand to defend their titles and the class of contestants in each of the events indicates that many records will be shattered if weather conditions are favorable.

Probably the strongest entry for team honors in the senior championships is the Illinois Athletic Club, runners-up in the national meet at Newark a year ago and winner of the indoor title at Buffalo last winter. Coach Johnny Behl of the Tricolor Club has entered a team of forty-seven athletes who are almost certain to score in a majority of the events.

During the last year the U. S. C. team has been strengthened by the addition of Gus Pope, national discus champion, who competed last year for the Multnomah A. C. of Portland; Ray Watson, one of the greatest runners in the country; Cyril Coaffee, the Canadian sprint champion; Peggo Wolters, former Olympic middle distance star, and Ivan Riley, national collegiate high hurdle champion.

Scarcely less formidable is the representation of the New York A. C., winner of the championship last year. The crack Gotham organization has a line-up of the last year's national "flying cop" who competed unattached in the meet at Newark a year ago. McAlister captured the 100-yard dash in both the senior and junior divisions of the national meet a year ago.

Boston is also slated to make a strong bid for the national title, as the B. A. A. has entered a well-balanced team of stars. Ned Gourdin, holder of the world's broad jump record and a graduate of Harvard, Plinsky, junior champion in the hop, step, jump, and Hennigan, the great five-mile runner, have all affiliated with the Boston club during the last year. Gourdin competed unattached in the meet a year ago.

Charles Brooks, the sensational hurdler, will lead a powerful team which will represent the University of Iowa. Brooks is primed to hand up a new world's record for the 220-yard low hurdles and is almost sure to better the A. A. U. mark of 24 seconds in this event. He will be pushed to the limit by J. S. Taylor of the New York A. C., winner of the event last year, and Karl Anderson of the Illinois Athletic Club, formerly a star at the University of Minnesota.

Efforts of Jule Ray to get a new world's record in the mile will be watched with interest, as the game little L. A. C. star is ready for his supreme effort. Jule won the mile last year at Newark in 4:14 2-5, which was one of his best performances and only a couple of seconds behind the mark long up by Taylor in 1925. Another nation's record holder in the 100-yard dash is the former runner in the event. He is the "Vernon" and is entering just as good a chance as any runner in the field to improve his record on several occasions and who is running now in the best form of his career.

In the running broad jump Gourdin and DeHart Hubbard, University of Michigan star are expected to stage a terrific duel for supremacy. Last year the Wolverine performer beat out the world's champion and since that time has indicated that he is running for a world's record of his own. Hubbard came within one inch of the world's record in the national collegiate meet at Stagg Field last June when he made a leap of 36 feet 2 inches.

For the first time in history events for girls will have a place on the A. A. U. program. Miss Camella Sabie of Newark, N. J., who scintillated in the games at Paris last year and who holds several American records, will compete. Miss Sabie will meet a formidable rival in Miss Helen Pitkey, a fifteen-year-old Chicago girl who recently equaled the world's record in the 60-yard hurdles.

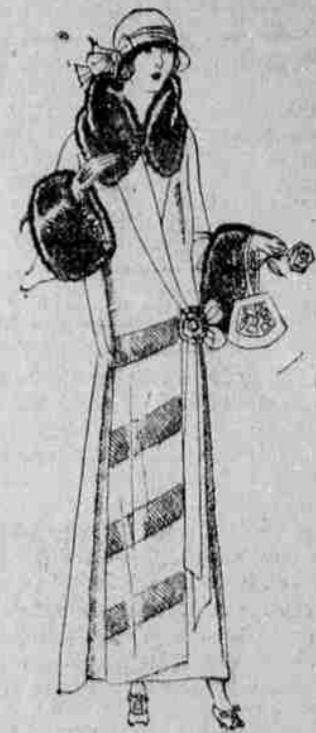
