Miss Friederike Schilke will return to Eugene tomorrow evening after spending several days at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Schilke.

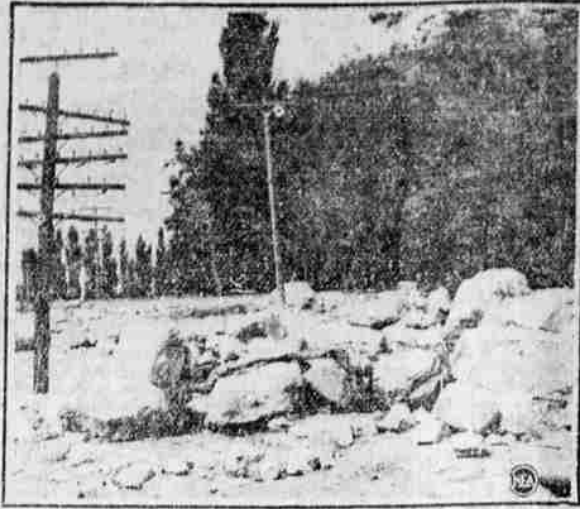

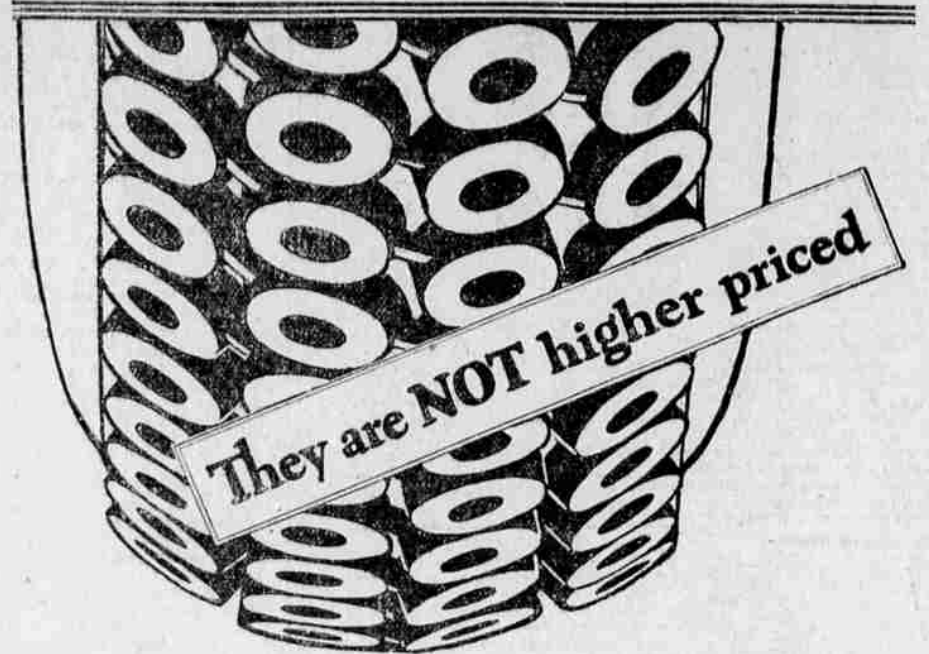
