Chinese Boycott of Japan Plans. Havoc With Exports. TOKYO. (AP)—Japan's export trade to China has suffered enormously during the last few months owing to the Chinese boycott of Japanese goods. Steamship companies also have been hard hit. Japanese merchants are up in arms and resolution after resolution is being passed demanding that the government take some firm action to bring about a change. The foreign office, however, has found it impossible to do more than send ships to protect Japanese subjects and property and bring the matter before the Chinese government with a request that local officials take steps to put an end to this unfriendly attitude. From the beginning of the year to the end of May Japan's export trade fell off by more than 29,000,000 Yen. Since then there has been no diminution of the boycott.

RUSSIA MAY SOON BALANCE BUDGET

LONDON. (U. N. S.).—Russia's financial position is not only improving more rapidly than that of any other country in Europe, but it is approaching the not very far-distant point at which the budget will be balanced without any deficit. This is the statement made here by the Russian Trade delegation in answer to an assertion in the House of Commons recently that extension of trading facilities to Russia was not possible because her financial condition did not warrant guarantees for merchants. The delegation states that the annual budget figures, which showed a deficit of 554 million gold rubles in 1922 on nine months' working, show only a 382-million-rubles deficit for the whole of 1922-23.
