Bairie Makes Ready For Go With Taylor

Heavy Training Is Order of the Day for La Grande Fighter; Determined to Win.

Bob Bairie is determined to defeat Bert Taylor later day—"for sure trying." The labor day card will be the opening of the boxing season in La Grande and with a snappy card arranged by Matchmaker Ed. Ford, fans are expected to gather from both Baker and Union counties to witness the combat. Tickets, on sale at the Imperial and Home theatres, are already being sold in promising numbers, for the meet which will be staged in the Rex hall, to open at 8:15 o'clock in the evening.

Bairie is training every afternoon at the ring erected in Joe Carr's backyard. Under a hot sun, Bob puts in a couple of hours every day shadow boxing, sparring, skipping rope and in every way getting himself ready for the match. Right now Bob appears to be in better condition than ever before since he has been fighting in La Grande. Both he and Taylor will fight at 125 pounds. A snappy workout yesterday afternoon was attended by several fans.

As in past battles, this will depend to a great extent upon his right, which has a driving power and strength that has more than once spelled the undoing of his adversary. He promises to start things in the first round and keep going at full speed until the end of the match. And with him hitting a fast pace, Taylor will have to.

Almost as much interest is being displayed in the Johnson-Wright semifinal as in the main event. Both boys are La Grander and are well known. Nearly equally matched they should put up a great fight.

The four-round preliminary and the battle royal should go along way toward putting the spectators into the right mood for the two final events.

Greb Meets Wilson In Title Go Tonight

NEW YORK (AP).—Harry Greb of Pittsburgh, former American light heavyweight champion, will fulfill a long sought ambition Friday night at 15-16th streets when he boxes Johnny Wilson of Boston, the title holder, for the middleweight championship in an 18-round match.

Wilson, one of the most inactive of present day champions, was under official ban in this state for some time because of his refusal to accept Greb's challenge to battle. His suspension was lifted, however, when he agreed to terms for Friday night's contest. Greb had been seeking a bout with Wilson for a year and a half.

The Pittsburgher broke camp at Manhasset, Long Island, Thursday and voiced confidence in his ability to lift the 160-pound crown. Wilson also was reported to be in excellent condition as he ended a training campaign of several weeks.

Davis Cup Will Be Defended Tomorrow

FOREST HILLS, N. Y. (A. P.)—The Davis cup, a trophy that has welded the friendship between many of the great nations of the world through their tennis players, a trophy sought this year by 13 nations outside the United States, is to be defended tomorrow on the turf courts of the West Side Club's concrete stadium by the Americans.

In the European zone France was victorious against Spain in the final round, winning the right to play Australia in the United States for the honor of challenging America for the cup. Czechoslovakia, Switzerland, India, Ireland, Argentina, France, Denmark, Spain, Rumania, Belgium, the British Isles, Italy and Holland were represented in the European zone.

This year were divided into two zones over competed for the cup since it was donated in 1906 by Dwight W. Davis of Washington, D. C., now president of the United States Lawn Tennis Association and Assistant Secretary of War. Australia won the cup six times, as did America, while Great Britain held it five times.
