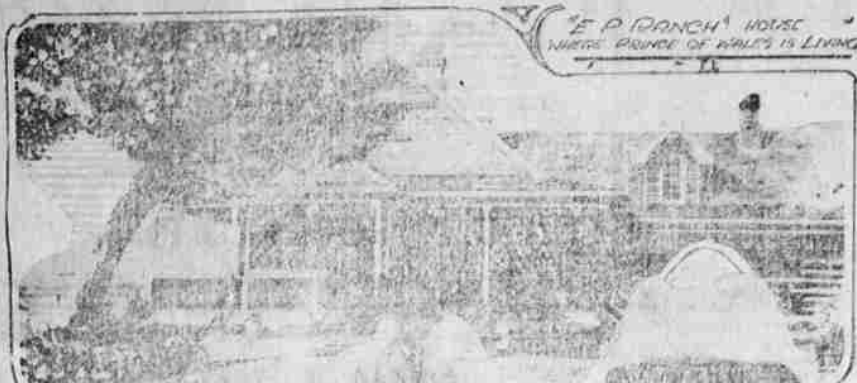


THE PRINCE OF WALES, TRAVELING AS LORD RENFREW, SEEKS REST ON HIS "E. P. RANCH" IN ALBERTA, CANADA



"E. P. RANCH" HOUSE WHERE PRINCE OF WALES IS LIVING

When the Prince of Wales toured Canada in 1919, he purchased a 4,000 acre ranch in the Canadian rolling country of southern Alberta, about 25 miles from High River, stocked it with thoroughbred cattle, sheep and horses and determined to spend a vacation there, the earliest possible opportunity. This year the opportunity came and the prince, traveling as Lord Renfrew, laid his plans to arrive in Sept. 12 and spend half of September and all of October enjoying the management of the ranch, hunting, fishing and enjoying the social activities of the life.

The prince, whose name is Edward, Prince, and the ranch is known as the "E. P. Ranch." It is managed by Prof. W. L. Carlyle, a Canadian by birth who had been on the staff of the Agricultural College at Ames, Iowa, previous to entering the service of the prince. On the ranch are some of the finest race horses, Percherons, Clydesdales, beef and dairy cattle from the King's famous studs at Sandringham and Shropshire and Hampshire sheep from the Duke of Westminster's flocks. It was possible to get in the United Kingdom, and they have taken prizes for the prince, the greatest live stock shows in both the United States and Canada. The prince is an enthusiastic breeder of cattle, sheep and horses, and is very well informed on the subject. He has already done much

to aid in the development of the ranch's live stock industry. Some of the thoroughbred cattle are now on loan to the University of Iowa. High River is 40 miles south of Calgary on the Canadian Pacific Railway, and the E. P. Ranch is in the heart of a great stock raising country. Cattle feed in the open all winter and thrive. To the west the Canadian Rockies lift their snow-capped peaks a mile above the blue waters of the Bow River.

TRADE OUTLOOK IS UNCERTAIN

Good Fall Volume in Pros-
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Last Spring Believed Un-
likely.

NEW YORK. (AP)—Business and irregularity in the markets last week were interpreted in financial quarters as reflecting uncertainty over the course of business. Most observers agreed that while a good volume of industrial activity is in prospect this fall, the pickup from midsummer dullness has been not more than what might be expected on a seasonal basis, and that a return to the high rate of last spring is unlikely. The view prevails that the spring boom required a buying in repurchase stock which had been dis- placed during the depression of 1921, and that the extraordinary volume of goods which is now being carried by railroads is made up largely of deliveries of orders placed at that time.

Nevertheless it is widely held that stocks of goods are moderate, that consumption is high, and that the credit position is comparatively easy. In this important particular this situation differs markedly from that of 1919 and 1920.

Business men have shown unusual caution in making commitments, and reports from business circles indi- cate that great caution has been maintained in the business credit position.

While business prospects are fairly good, brokerage houses feel that they are not particularly promising to encourage renewed public partici- pation in the stock market. And with public participation reduced, specu- lations naturally are severely dimi- nished, a condition which creates pessimism in the brokerage trade.

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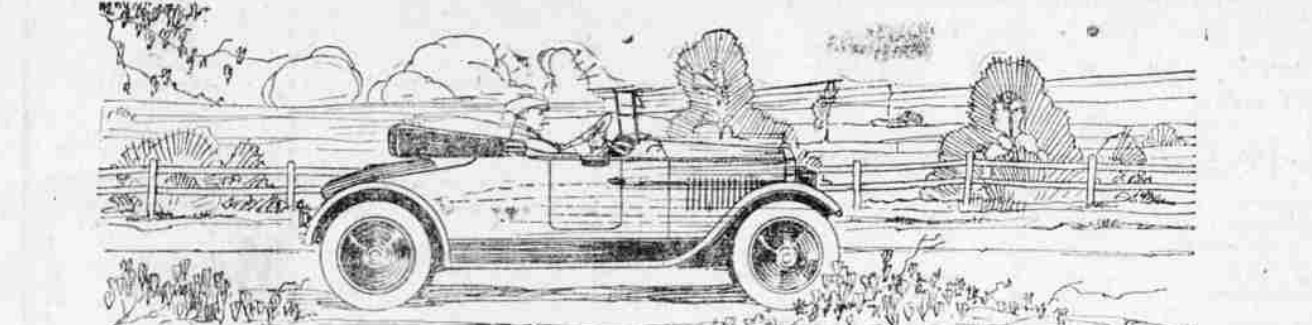
