The record for the course was established in 1915 by George Carney, professional. Walter Hagen, Jim Barnes and Joe Kirkwood, world known stars, have all played over the course but have failed to come close to tying or bettering the record.

Von Elm had a chance to establish a new mark on No. 9, 498-yard hole par five. He was on the edge of the green in two, being 20 feet from the cup. His putt fell short by two inches for a single three. Von Elm held out in four for a birdie four.

all previous coalition governments which founded on party prestige proved their incapacity to grapple with the economic fundamentals of the internal situation with respect to reparations.

With the wreckage of passive resistance confronting him, Chancellor Stresemann is said to be determined to put into immediate effect a program of drastic economic and salvaging measures, which will show scant consideration for the sensibilities of the employers of organized labor or the propertied classes. With such prospects in view, it is believed the socialists would prefer to return to their oppositional position in the Reichstag in preference to holding seats on the government benches.

French Rule Dueseldorf.

DUESSELDORF, (AP)—French troops are patrolling the streets of Dueseldorf today, having assumed the entire responsibility of maintaining order. A formal state of siege has not been declared, but the curfew law, closing activities from 11 p. m. to 5 p. m., is being rigidly enforced. These measures were deemed necessary as a result of yesterday's outbreak at a separatist meeting, resulting in the killing of half a score of Germans and the wounding of many others the French finally intervening.

A casualty list shows 10 persons were killed and more than 200 seriously wounded. Probably another hundred were slightly injured.

French Run Down Red Plot.

PARIS.—French police officials are actively engaged in running down a communist plot to create defections in the army.

Military News Censored.

BERLIN.—A censorship has been imposed on all military news sent from Germany.

LONDON.—When we talk about a century we are apt to do so very respectfully, for it seems to represent such a long period of time. And yet, of course, from the scientific point of view, a century is a mere flash in the pan—a matter of a few seconds in the life of the world.

What developments are likely to take place in "the few seconds" that separate us today from the year 2023? Speculations on the subject are fascinating.

It is too much to suppose that the business man who is fond of saying "time is money" will not be content to spend more than half his life eating, traveling, playing and sleeping? The business man who economizes in these respects will be more successful according to his dictum, and therefore this type must develop.

Travel Speeded Up.

Travel, of course, will be speeded up enormously within the next century, and there is nothing against reducing our stop ration, while as to food the changes taking place are obvious. The "three bottle" man has gone long ago, and the business man who until only a few years ago had to eat big dinners with his friends cheerfully relies now on sandwiches. No doubt in a hundred years' time food labels at the office will be regarded as ample for his needs.
