SMITH BUYS NEW RADIO OUTFIT

Advanced Radio Work Garage Man Has Heacock Make a Special Selective Equipment.

L. C. Smith, owner of the Smith garage, believes that there is no such thing as standing still in any line of work, all of which describes the intense interest he has taken in radio and further explains that he has made marked advancement in being able to handle radio equipment and get excellent results.

WALTON IS REBUKED BY HEAVY VOTE

Constitutional Amendment Passed Empowering State Legislature to Meet.

CAPITOL IS AGAIN UNDER GUARD TODAY

Early Returns Indicate That Opponents of Governor Are Winners Four to One.

OKLAHOMA CITY. (AP)—Opponents of Governor Walton scored a sweeping victory yesterday in the most spectacular election ever held in Oklahoma.

By an excessive majority a constitutional amendment passed empowering the state legislature to meet on its own call to consider impeachment charges against the governor.

The victory was believed responsible in part for the defeat of five other constitutional amendments, including the soldier bonus.

The state capitol is again under the guard of state troops today.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. (AP)—With virtually one-fourth of the state heard from at 9:30 o'clock, it was indicated that a constitutional amendment to open the way for the state legislature to consider the official record of Governor J. C. Walton had swept to victory with the greatest majority ever recorded in an election in Oklahoma.

On the basis of returns up to that hour, compiled by four newspapers of the state, it was indicated that the measure would carry by approximately 250,000.

Eleven hundred and nine precincts out of 2527 in the state on the proposition gave: Yes, 124,576; no, 32,702. It is estimated that the total vote will be approximately 450,000.

Partial returns from 38 out of 77 counties in the state indicated that the measure had won in each.

In two counties no votes were cast because election supplies did not arrive from Oklahoma City, the election having been delayed by last-minute litigation.

Fight Just Begun.

Governor J. C. Walton issued the following statement at 9:30 o'clock: "The fight on the invisible empire has just started in Oklahoma. I am still governor of the state."

At that hour the returns indicated that a majority of 250,000 votes had been cast in the special election Tuesday for a measure opening the way for the state legislature to consider impeachment charges against him.

Marital law status throughout the state will remain unchanged, the executive stated.

Troops which have been held in reserve during the day for an emergency were not used, he said, and no disorders or requests for services of guardianship were received.

Walton Repudiated, Says Melice. Representative W. D. Melice of Stephens county said in a statement Tuesday night that such an overwhelming majority has repudiated Governor Walton's administration that it no longer can be held representative of a small portion of the people.
