ROLLING HOT WATER SPOUTS FROM WELL

LAKEVIEW, Or.—While boring for artesian water at the hot springs two miles north of here Friday, a flow of hot water was encountered at a depth of 55 feet. When the drill was removed it was found that a geyser had been tapped. Ever since it spouts at intervals of six minutes, throwing a column of water 46 feet in the air.

Boise Plays Baker Oct. 6

Boise Football Mentor Expects Baker Aggregation to Be "Tough Picking."

BOISE (AP).—Baker high school's football team will not be "easy picking" for the Boise team in their game here next Saturday, Coach W. C. Kahn of the Boise school said Tuesday. "If my men win they will have to go their best all the time," Kahn said, and added, "I have about 20 men ready for the battle and if I'm not mistaken I am going to have a chance to use all of them."

Frankly, Coach Kahn is not expecting an easy game. At the same time abundant evidence of the confidence of Baker players, coach and student body have in winning next Saturday's contest has been received. A letter to Coach Kahn from the Baker high school principal received Tuesday says:

"The football prospects for Baker high are looking up bigger than ever this season and a well drilled bunch of players is going up against Boise high school veterans at Boise. With the return of about six better men, Coach Charles King is molding a real team around them. The team this year will no doubt outweigh last year's team several pounds per man."

Officials chosen for Saturday's game are: R. H. Broadbent, referee; Frank Hammet, umpire, and S. D. Hays, head linesman.

Boise high school's players are in good condition, Coach Kahn said. Scrimmage has been the order of the day so far this week. Some of the men have been showing up good in the preliminary practices, but how they will act under fire is still a matter of conjecture. After Saturday Coach Kahn expects to have a fair idea of the men who are to uphold Boise's colors for the rest of the season.

The second team will play in Emmett next Friday.

Men expected to play in the first game of the season are: Ends: T. Robinson, Hafter, Nibler. Tackles: DeMott, Wing and Robinson.

Guards: Small, Hays, Gaddy and Tucker; Gilliam and Brace. Backfield: Rollins, quarterbacks; Quinter, Higgs and Lettendon; halfbacks; Paroona, Brown and Smith, fullbacks.

Scrim practices, to which only players and assistant coaches will be admitted, start today, Coach Kahn said.

REALTY MAN IS HELD CAUSE LEAPING CO

Illinois Man Indicates Property Trades as the Sign of Present Prices.

Many for Sale

"Two-thirds of the houses in the United States are for sale," Race said. "No sooner has a man sold a piece of property than he is looking for a profit for the owner and a percentage than he turns and lists the same property again at an increased price. His glib tongue, his irrepressible energy and his unscrupulousness as he forces a sale at a increased value, then lists and property again at a still higher price. He repeats and repeats this process, the price up and order to make the owners believe it is double the real value of the property."

Rentier Must Pay

"And the renter—at each sale rent must be jumped to pay the level in the increased investment in the property he is occupying. The owner of the building has no choice but to either up with the renter's money."

"These real estate men, with their big salaries, have been up the country like a great locust. They have added billions to the value of American property with their flowery sales talks, and the whole country is paying for living up to this false talk."

Race had no remedy to suggest for the situation. He dismissed as an impracticable and with a strong statement that the matter was to go down among the masses of the country along with fifteen-dollar coal, forty-cent beef and thirty dollar salaries.
