Famous French Recipes

Pears Bourdaloue.
Paris, (L.N.S.)—It's pear time in Paris and French housewives know many delightful ways of preparing this luscious fruit for desserts. For pears Bourdaloue choose ripe but firm fruit and cook them whole if they are not too large in a vanilla syrup. Drain and arrange in a large baking pan upon a thick layer of aromatic soaked with milk, sweetened and flavored and thickened with eggs. Powder with crushed macaroons and pour over melted butter. Brown at the moment of serving and surround with a few spoonfuls of apricot sauce.

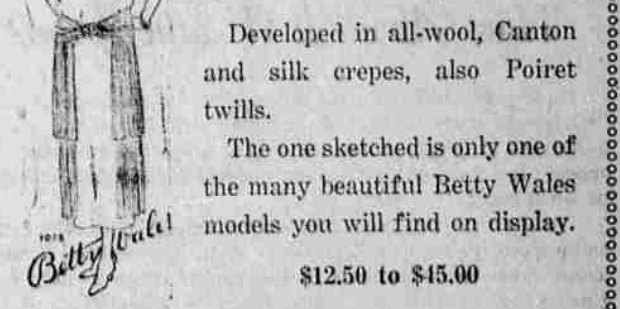
