Eugene Building Active.

ELUGENE, Or. — Building permits totaling \$34,000 were issued in Eugene in September, according to the report of W. H. Alexander, city building inspector. The amount of new construction in August amounted to \$22,543. Forty-nine permits were issued during September, the largest being one of \$25,000 for the construction of the new home of the Sigma Xi fraternity of the University of Oregon. Construction in September last year totaled \$24,850, with 41 permits, the largest being for \$27,000 for building of the

school of journalism at the University of Oregon.

That new building construction in Eugene is above many other cities with a much larger population is indicated by reports just received by the local building inspector. During July the total cost of building construction in Eugene was \$161,450.

Belgian train operators, six German trainmen and 2,360 German auxiliary workers were employed on the occupied system; or a total of 13,440 persons. In July, 1923, French and Belgian trainmen, 357 German trainmen and 9,224 German auxiliary workers—a total of 10,938 persons—were employed. Before the occupation the total personnel, including officials and workmen, amounted to 247,000. This number, about 200,000 have in the occupied area, or have been expelled, leaving about 45,000 employed still in the occupied zone to do whatever emergency work they can.

Passenger Traffic: In March 1923, 10 passenger trains, including German civilians and military travelers, were run on the trains, whereas in July a passenger traffic had increased to 10,000 persons, of whom about two-thirds were German civilians. This, in fact, is a formal against the use of force as against the German trainmen by German civilians. During the months of October, November and December, 1922, the passenger traffic over the German-managed lines, judging from the number of tickets sold, amounted to 97,254 persons, making the monthly list of passengers about 22,415,000, as reported, with 2,415,000 carried on the trains during July, 1923.

The thing that made it plain was the challenge of a league's authority by signor Salandra for Italy, coupled with the great fact that if the league undertook to interfere, Italy would leave. Today Italy is evacuating Corfu; it is not left the league, and signor Salandra is pleading that the question of the league's jurisdiction shall not be taken up. PENDLETON, Or. — On instructions from the county court, a committee of three land owners will start tomorrow morning making new appraisements of orchard lands in Umatilla county. The move to make new appraisements resulted from an investigation made by the board of tax equalization in which it was found that many orchards now in bearing are valued the same as when the orchards were first set out.

The members of the committee are W. A. Wallace, field assessor in the Milton district and a fruit man; John McKeown, owner of both wheat and fruit lands, and H. P. Jensen, orchardist.
