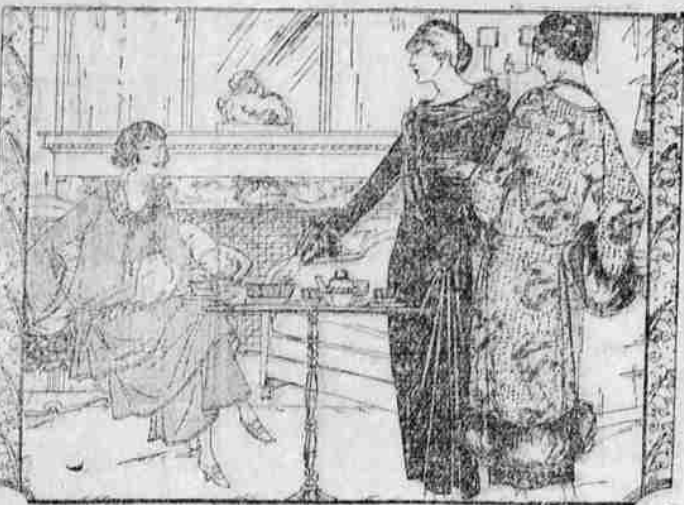




Afternoon Frocks

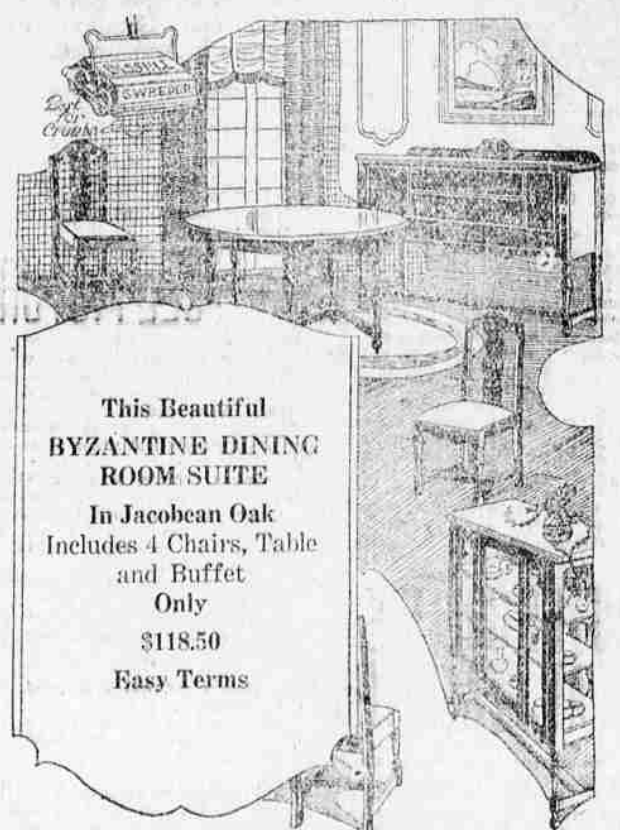
