KLAMATH PAGEANT DEPICTS PASSING OF COVERED WAGON

KLAMATH FALLS. In a natural outdoor amphitheater seating 10,000 persons, Klamath Falls will stage on October 12, a pageant, "The Passing of the Covered Wagon," celebrating the beginning of construction on the Southern Pacific's new line from Klamath Falls to Coquille, Oregon, 113 miles. This will be one feature of two days of unique pageantry and carnival events here, October 12 and 13, exploiting the scenic attractions and resources of this great new region. The general public is invited to attend and special invitations have been sent to the governors of California, Oregon and Washington as well as to the principal commercial organizations of the Pacific coast.

The celebration will open at 10 a. m. Friday with a parade depicting the primitive development and progress made from the time of the Indians by pioneer farmers, trappers, lumbermen and cowboys, as well as later progress. Friday afternoon will be taken up with auto rides to points of interest, including the Sprague River district.

Friday evening there will be staged the pageant "The Passing of the Covered Wagon" and "The Crater," the latter outlining the history of the creation of the world famous Crater Lake which lies along the new railroad line.

Saturday morning there will be an excursion to Klamath where will be held a ceremony marking the laying of the first rail on the so-called Naton Coast line. Saturday afternoon at Klamath Falls special exercises will be held including a concert and other addresses. Lumbermen's conference will be held on the water front of Klamath Lake, the largest body of fresh water in the United States aside from the Great Lakes.

Saturday evening will be given over to big street carnival and dancing.

SHANGHAI (API)—Ivory dealers and ivory carvers in China are profiting largely just now by reason of the fact that something approximating a craze for one of China's most ancient games has been sweeping through both the United States and Europe. 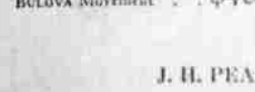
