

Quiet Reigns In Oklahoma; Court Halted

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. (By the Associated Press)—The mad rush of the last few days momentarily stopped Oklahoma Thursday night took stock of her position and conjectured as to the future.

With the court battle between Governor J. C. Walton and members of the Oklahoma house of representatives halted until next Tuesday, citizens whose attention had been fastened on the spectacular contest between the executive and legislative branches of the state government turned to matters that had been forced into the background, and realized that martial law under which they have lived for nearly three weeks has become military rule virtually in name only.

In Oklahoma City the military court that was considering to dissolve into alleged lawlessness of the Ku Klux Klan not only has been abandoned, but the grip of the military has been removed from the city in every respect. Military headquarters have been abandoned, and persons appearing on the streets after midnight no longer need

pages. No patrols challenge the late wanderers.

Likewise in Tulsa, the sole remaining activity of the military is the court of inquiry. This still is in session, but guards nowhere else are to be seen. In authoritative quarters it was said that less than a dozen troopers are now on duty in Tulsa.

Great Fight Promised.

Pointing to the executive's statement Wednesday night, referring to the election which he has called for December 6, to resubmit a constitutional amendment empowering the legislature to convene at its own call as an impeachment body, in which Walton declared that in the next two months "will be fought the most historic political battle in history," observers Thursday night prophesied that the entire removal of martial law would be one of the governor's first moves to increase his political strength.

Governor Walton said that no cases two weeks, indicating, he believed, the situation well in hand.

The court proceedings were postponed Thursday on agreement of counsel for members of the legislature who seek an injunction to restrain the governor's agents from interfering with an assembly of the legislature as an impeachment body.

The case is to be held in abeyance until a decision is reached on another injunction action instituted by the governor, to prevent a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature

to meet on its own call from becoming effective. This suit is directed at the state election board to prevent certification of returns from Tuesday's special election, in which the amendment was passed, and thus block the way for the legislature to meet.

Court Hearing Tuesday.

A hearing to make permanent the temporary restraining order granted the governor will be held next Tuesday.

In announcing that they would await the outcome of the governor's case, attorneys for the legislators indicated that, should the court rule against the executive, their authority written into the constitution, there would be no further necessity to test in the courts the legislators' right to meet without a call.

Meanwhile a district court grand jury here has been called to meet October 15, to consider some of Governor Walton's official acts.

The investigation was ordered Thursday by District Judge George W. Clark, in response to a petition submitted by Campbell Russell and more than 100 citizens. The petition charges that the governor misused state funds and that he appointed thousands of state police agents without authority or law.

Prune Prices Boosted.

SALEM, Or.—The Oregon Growers' Co-operative association, with headquarters in Salem, today announced an increase of from 1 to 1 1/2 cents a pound on dried prunes packed in 25-pound boxes. A similar advance was announced by the California, Prune and Apricot Growers association according to a telegram received here.

On 20-20s the Oregon association has quoted a price of 11 cents. For 20-40s the quotation is 11 cents, while for 40-50s the price has been fixed at 12 cents.

Other prices follow: 50-60s, 9 1/2 cents; 75 cents; 60-70s, 8 cents; 70-80s, 7 cents; 80-90s, 6 1/2 cents; 90-100s, 5 1/2 cents; 5 1/2-4 cents; 6 cents; 90-100s, 5 cents; 5 1/2 cents.

It was predicted that the increase in the prices will tend to stimulate the market.

Legion Auxiliary Planned.

PENDLETON, Or.—A women's auxiliary to the Pendleton post of the American Legion will be formed in the near future if women who are eligible to membership evince an interest in the organization. It was decided last night at the meeting of the post, Gilbert Conner, an Indian ex-service man, asked the assistance of the Pendleton organization in providing some organization for the 45 ex-service men on the Umatilla Indian reservation. An athletic club may be formed. Conner suggested that a legion post for his tribesmen might be organized.

Queer "Murder" Case Solved by Physician.

HARVARD, Ill. (INS)—Harvard's great murder mystery has been solved and the city has settled back to the peace from which the finding of a man's head in a local dump aroused it. Two boys playing in the dump made the ghastly discovery. Police were at once called and the county coroner was summoned. The splendid state of preservation indicated that the man had not been long dead.

Dr. N. L. Seelye, a local eye, ear, nose and throat specialist, dispelled the murder theory by informing police that he had had the head for a number of years for experimental purposes and that it had been thrown away by persons cleaning out his barn.
