Lot of President Has Ameliorated, Is Claim

WASHINGTON, (AP).—Modern presidents may have a large amount of routine work devolving upon them, but there are some details attended to regularly by their early predecessors, that are hardly considered to the White House.
 Among these, according to Charles Kohlen, Washington philatelist and document collector, was the trifling detail of signing ships' clearance papers. Among a number of ancient documents recently picked up were two such clearances for small vessels, one signed "G. Washington," the other bearing the large, scrawly signature of John Adams.
 The paper signed by Washington in September 1794 attested to the fact that the 52-ton schooner "Eliza" of New York was owned by citizens of the new nation and was duly attested to set sail for the West Indies with a cargo of flour, hoops, onions, staves, shingles and scantlings. The form was made out in English, French and Dutch.
 The document signed by President Adams bore also as a counter-signature the signature of Timothy Pickens, secretary of state; was dated August 1798, showed the proper nationality of the small sloop "Endeavour," and gave leave to depart from Portland, Maine, to Demerarra, with a cargo of boards, oars, butter, fish, flour, tar, pitch and beef.
 The most interesting section of these clearance papers was an attestation at the bottom of the sheet praying that "Most Serene, Supreme, Most Potent, Pious, High, Illustrious, Noble, Honorable, Venerable, Wise and Prudent, Lords, Emperors, Kings, Republics, Princes, Dukes, Earls, Barons, Schepens, Judges, Councilors" and a long list of other officers "of all the good cities and places who shall see these presents or hear them read" to recognize the American registry.
 Mr. Kohlen has also a number of envelopes showing the differences in postal rates and speed of service since the early days of the post office. One contained a letter signed by James Madison as secretary of state, in 1804, to James Sheafe of Portsmouth, N. H., and bore a stamp showing the fee for the trip to have been ten cents. Another Annandean polar expedition, addressed to President Harding, which was sent by airplane to Nome, Alaska, and thence across the continent to Washington for 12 cents, including registration fee.
 Another interesting document in this collection is one relating to the history of the famous Lord Fairfax, who was granted large estates in Virginia by the King of England during early colonial history. Lord Thomas prayed the sheriff of Loudoun County, which adjoined his estates, to take into custody Ann Seward who was charged with trespassing upon the Fairfax estate in 1763. According to the yellowed form manuscript, the said Ann had wrought damages estimated at 550 pounds, for which the said Lord Thomas required payment.

 None of the industrial experts with whom Chancellor Stresemann conferred on the question of entering a restricted cabinet appeared attracted by the prospects of quarreling with the Reichstag and wisely informed the chancellor that the elimination of parliament would be a primary precondition to any serious attempt at internal reconstruction.

BALLET CHIEFS NOW ORGANIZED

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, (AP).—Contending that most modern dancing teachers "know nothing at all about ballet, and confine their work solely to the simple form of ball room dance," Stefano Mascago of New York, nationally known dance master, has announced that the Ballet Teachers' Association of America was being organized so that "the real art of dancing may be maintained."
 The founders of the new organization, besides Mr. Mascago, are Fred Christensen, of Seattle, Wash.; William F. Christensen, of Ogden, Utah; and L. P. Christensen of Salt Lake City, all of whom announced that they have resigned their membership in the American Association, Masters of Dancing, coincident with the organization of the new body.
 "We have no personal quarrel with any member of the American Association, either personally or officially," said Mr. Mascago. "We are forming the new organization because the American Association has failed to emphasize the importance and significance of the ballet."
 "Social dancing has its rightful place," asserted L. P. Christensen, "but if the dignity and worth of dancing is to be maintained as a serious art, an art demanding years of study and training, the ballet, which is the mother of all dancing, must be given careful attention."
 Headquarters of the new dancing association, it was announced, will be maintained temporarily in Salt Lake City.

School Budget Lower

SEASIDE, Or.—Of 20 school districts submitting budgets to the Clatsop county tax commission, 14 are asking for less money than last year, and six are increasing their estimate. Twenty more will be heard from during the week, Seaside, Warrenton and Gearhart have incomplete. ETALONIN Gearhart have reported, but the budgets are incomplete. Astoria has been allowed until October 10 to report, and Hammond, the fifth incorporated city in Clatsop county, has not been heard from, said Herman Wise, secretary to the commission.
 The tendency to reduce taxes is thought to be due to the unusual publicity attached to the expense estimates which are being laid before the tax commission for the first time this year, said Mr. Wise.

Plan Monument at Graves of Lincoln's Parents

JANESVILLE, Ill., (AP)—After years of neglect the graves of Thomas and Nancy Lincoln, father and step-mother of Abraham Lincoln, are to be given attention.
 These unkept mounds, in a nearby desolate graveyard, are marked only by unheeded stones made rough by tourists who have chipped souvenirs from them.
 The Illinois district of the Lions International has undertaken to raise funds among its members to erect a fitting monument at the graves.

Black Knights Incorporated

SALT LAKE, Or.—The Royal Black Knights of Ireland, with capital stock of \$500 and headquarters in Portland, has been incorporated by Martin H. Johnston, J. Rowland Pierce and Walter C. Elford. The purpose of the organization is to promote the welfare and social interests of its members.

 200, making a total of nearly \$25,000 when the bonds become due. These figures are approximate and figured low. There are companies appearing as high as five and one-half per cent interest on issues of this kind, which in the period stated would increase materially the total fund.
