SHERRY'S SUN-MON-TUES

First Showing of the Great Dramatic Epic at the Sherry Theatre Next Sun-Mon-Tues. D. W. Griffith, the creative artist, has done his latest work on a scale of grandeur with the screen as his easel. He is a dynamic and direct art on the screen people for plastic poses instead of static poses.

An Epic of the Past. Griffith interprets the beautiful both from the standpoint of the emotional and the pictorial. The emotional catches the eye, and the pictorial the discriminating. Yet the two are as much essential to the life of his picture as the soul and the body are essential to life.

In "Orphans of the Storm" the epic which Mr. Griffith has made of the intensely human drama, "The Two Orphans," a wide range of art has been expressed. This master picture, released by United Artists, and which will be the attraction at the Sherry Theatre Sun-Mon-Tues presents among other things: An interior of a French country home, where the blind Louise is first seen, as a static composition of unusual appeal.

There are characters, any one of which might have come from one of Montaigne's essays, in the Hall of Mirrors, more impressive than any description or printed picture, beautiful with its subtle effect of light and shadow.

Picture like Dr. Griffith's of Watteau's paintings in the fête sequence—an effect rarely secured in art. Effects of moving horses, described as "more wonderful than the studies of Degas."

A subtle, calculated composition in the cattle table scene, focusing the interest on Danton through the irresistible direction of the lines of the table in the foreground, the position of the man, the order of the candlesticks, and the vanishing point in the background.

Art students will appreciate these refinements in the living scenes from a technical viewpoint, while others will feel only an indefinable sense of pleasure resting in itself. Such is the art of Griffith.
