Yanks Singly Not As Team Excel Giants

Individual Yank Stars Are Brightest, But Giants May Repeat as in Prior Cases.

NEW YORK.—Taken as so many individuals the New York Yankees stand superior to the Giants, by the writer's casual reckoning, in six positions out of a possible nine. As a manager's choice in the impending world's series, the Yanks are worth no more than even money and not too much of that. Psychology, the breaks and the ability of the Giants to step out to meet any big moment with their ears pinned back, so to speak, all but negate the minimum advantage of the situation.

It has done just that for two successive world's series. In both the great impact of allegedly interior pitching the results approved rather than sustained this theory. It merely happened that nine men, playing an one but thinking their individual thoughts were—and are—a better combination than nine men playing as nine and thinking by rote, if at all.

Yet the man-to-man proposition has some value in the pre-series calculations and, as such, it may be dug into in this particular. Everything depends on how much or how little they take advantage of these individual superiorities.

Joe Dugan, for example, was rated far above Helms Grob as a third baseman before the 1922 games, but Grob fiddled and hit occasionally while Dugan merely played average baseball—better, suffered by comparison.

It was the same in pitching. The Giants were supposed to have a spangled staff, yet Nell, J. Barnes, Scott and McQuillan stepped out and out-pitched the Yanks in every game. Perhaps they will do so again. Barnes is among the departed, but McQuillan's staff is better for the addition of Watson and Jack Bentley, and a well-pitched game by either might throw all calculations overboard. However, as they stand, Jones, Bush, Hoyt, Dembeck, Shawkey and Mays are a stronger combination of pitchers—on paper—than anything Melisow can summon. That is, on paper.

Another is that of Dugan over Grob, who has become a bit elderly and possibly will not repeat his 1922 exhibition. A third is that of Pip over Kelly at first base, although some may be pleased to dissent on this point.

Wally is not quite as dangerous a hitter as the Giant great. He is more consistent and dependent, however, and will cover more ground around the bag.

Around second base the Giants come to the front with the Frisch-Baneroff combination, which is considerably superior to that of Ward and Scott. Frisch is a better all-around ball player than Ward can ever hope to be, although the latter has developed into one of the best second basemen in baseball during the present season. He is not in Frisch's class as a hitter, base runner and quick thinker, however.

Baneroff, likewise, is a better shortstop and ball player than Scott, who has slumped down to a slanter. In fact, the Beauty is one of the really great shortstops of the modern generation.

In left field the new Ruth is so far ahead of Emil Muesel as to obviate any comparison. He can outfield, outfield and outfield into seven days out of seven. Yet it may be as happen that Muesel will be the champion of the series and Ruth the champion.

Will is a better all-around man in center field than either Stengel or Cronin, being able to range far and wide for balls hit into his territory.

U. OF O. HAS MORE STUDENTS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene.—(Special)—An increase of about 5 per cent in the enrollment for the academic year on the University of Oregon campus at Eugene is indicated by the registration to date of full-time students.

The full-time registration on the Eugene campus at noon, Oct. 4, was 1166, only five fewer than the total for the entire fall term a year ago. Registrar Carlton E. Spencer predicts a total registration before fall enrollment ends of from 2225 to 2240 students, as against 2185 last fall. He expects a total enrollment at Eugene for the year—fall, winter and spring terms—of between 2500 and 2600.

Creditable have been granted to 1166 new students for matriculation or transfer to the University of Oregon since last communication. Of those 1166, the number registering so far has been 875. Men of the remaining 223 will enter in the winter term or in subsequent years. The number of applicants for admission, 1166 is far in excess of any corresponding number in the University's history.

The registration at the University of Oregon school of medicine in Portland to noon, Oct. 4 was 192. The University thus far has a full-time Eugene and Portland campus registration of 2577. Figures are not available yet for the new year on the registration of Portland center
