REPORTS FINE CONVENTION

Osteopaths Pleased with Hospitality Extended Them Sunday by Baker.

Walla Walla, Pendleton and La Grande Osteopaths, who returned to La Grande Sunday night were enthusiastic in their reports of the Osteopathic convention finished at Baker. According to reports the Baker hosts not only set a high mark for hospitality and entertainment, but the scientific end of the program was unusually good.

The real feature of the program was an address and free clinic by Dr. Howard A. Post, of Oakland, California, originator of the "Post System of Fallen Arches." Dr. Post is a foot specialist and for the past several years has been the physician in charge of all foot cases, on the famous University of California track team.

Dr. Post claims most foot pain is caused by the dropping down of one or more of the small "Keystone" bones of the arch of the foot. He has invented a small appliance which he uses to assist him in the replacement of these small bones.

Dr. Ingle, who was present reports that it was the most spectacular demonstration of foot correction that he has ever seen, and that of the 42 cases examined and treated in the free clinic, nearly all reported relief. The doctor was so impressed with the methods of Dr. Post that he succeeded in getting him to promise to stop at La Grande for a few days on his return from his vacation in Idaho, and to instruct him in his method and to hold a free foot clinic here.

Fuel Tax Record Made.
SALEM, Or. — August, 1922, smashed all previous records for gasoline and distillate sales in Oregon in a single month, according to a report issued today by Sam A. Koser, secretary of state.

The state tax on gasoline and distillate sales during the month totaled \$283,377.58. This was for 848,963 gallons of gasoline and 548,341 gallons of distillate.

Of the total tax collected \$17,615.25 resulted from operation of the original law imposing a tax of 1 cent a gallon on gasoline and a 1-1/2 cent a gallon on distillate. Approximately \$150,762 was realized under the additional tax law levying 2 cents a gallon on all kinds of motor vehicle fuels.
