Beavers Sure Of A Third In Coast Race

Pacific Coast League Comes into Last Week with Frisco Sure Champion; Portland Has Chance for Second.

Table with Pacific Coast League standings: Frisco, Sacramento, Portland, Seattle, Salt Lake, Los Angeles, Oakland, Vernon.

Securely anchored in third place, with a fighting chance to get into second during the closing week of the season, the Portland Beavers left here last night for Seattle to wind up the 1923 Pacific Coast League season.

Seven games are scheduled with the Indians, but as the Beavers have an eight-game lead over their Northern rivals, it doesn't require a mathematician to determine that Portland couldn't lose its present place in the race even should it drop all seven games to 5-11.

Sacramento in second place, is three games ahead of the Beavers. It is possible to catch the Beavers, but improbable. Sacramento, on its home grounds should be able to win as many games from Salt Lake as Portland does against Seattle, playing away from home.

This is the only interest left in the Coast league race, the fight for second place, as San Francisco has already clinched the pennant and Seattle can hardly be ousted from fourth place by Salt Lake, which is five games behind the Indians.
