Manila Doubles Cigar Exports

MANILA, (AP) — Approximately 15,275,000 Philippine cigars were shipped to the United States by local exporters during the month of July this year, the bureau of internal revenue has announced.

During the period from July 1, 1922 to June 30, 1923, Philippine cigars valued at 13,781,835 pesos (about \$6,599,919) were shipped to the United States. During the fiscal year just preceding this the value of Philippine cigars shipped to the United States was only half that amount.

NORWALK, Ohi. (INS) — The heart of Henry C. Morrison, 55, who died here recently was on the right side, and other internal organs were interchanged, an autopsy revealed after his death. The condition had prevailed from birth, physicians said.

CONSTANTINOPLE (INS) — This city, an exciting the chief city of the Moslem Empire, is to have a smartest police force, according to a new order issued by the director of Police.

In a circular to policemen he orders them to shave a minimum of twice weekly and not to wear their police caps at the "fashionable angle."
