Remove the skin from the fowl and cut up. Chop and crush the bones and add to the sauce. Boil for a moment and pour over the fowl. Add cooked mushrooms and arrange with crisp croutons about it.

## HARDING ESTATE APPRAISED AT HALF MILLION

MARION, O. (By the Associated Press)—The total value of the late President Harding's estate, according to the report of the appraisers filed in probate court here Thursday, exclusive of the Harding Publishing company stock, which has not yet been appraised, was set at \$486,862.64.

Personal property and chattels were appraised at \$415,454; money, \$34,825.90; securities, \$406,794.91; and real estate at \$46,729.

Prices on Farm Products Advance During September

WASHINGTON (AP)—Farm prices trended upward during September and on October 1 the index figure of prices paid to producers for the principal farm crops was 2.2 per cent higher than a year ago, 25.6 per cent higher than two years ago but 11.3 per cent lower than the average of the last 10 years on October 1. These statistics were announced Thursday by the department of agriculture which said the price level in broad 22 per cent during September while the level for the last 10 years decreased about 4.2 per cent during that month.

Prices of hogs, cattle, sheep and chickens paid to producers increased 7.5 per cent from August 15 to September 15 while in the last 10 years prices decreased 12.5 per cent in the

corresponding period. The index figure of prices for these meat animals on September 15, was about 6.1 per cent lower than a year ago, 7.9 per cent higher than two years ago and 21.4 per cent lower than the average of the last 10 years on September 15.

Santa Fe President Denies McAdoo Charge

TULSA, Okla. (By the Associated Press)—The recent charge of William G. McAdoo that the railroads tried to obtain from the government millions of dollars that did not belong to them in connection with federal control of lines, was denied here Thursday by W. B. Storey, president of the Santa Fe, in an address before the second annual southwestern business congress. Mr. Storey said he spoke in ignorance of the charge as his railroad was concerned.
