KENT SURVEY SHOWS WHEAT CROP HEAVY

Forecasted at 3,621,454,000 bushels, as compared with 2,946,712,000 bushels produced last year, and 2,665,569,000 bushels two years ago.

Wheat

We have no recent data which would call for a modification of our forecast of 21,325,000 bushels of winter wheat in Oregon. Reports of yields of spring wheat indicate a probable average yield per acre of about 20 bushels which would slightly increase the earlier spring wheat estimate and bring the total for all wheat to about 26,500,000 bushels, compared with 362,691,000 last year, and five year average of 20,841,000 bushels.

The United States total wheat crop prospect fell off about 7,400,000 bushels during September, and is now estimated at 751,737,000 bushels, compared with 562,991,000 last year, and the five year average of 534,801,000 bushels.

Oats

The Oregon oats crop was the best in several years, although not up to early expectations. Cool moist weather during much of the month of June followed by a few days of unusually high temperatures, appear to have checked development of the crop, and many fields did not fill well. Reports indicated a yield of about 35.9 bushels per acre, and a state crop of about 10,500,000 bushels, compared with 6,675,000 bushels last year, and five year average of 8,849,000 bushels.

The United States crop is estimated at 1,392,455,000 bushels, compared with 1,215,496,000 bushels last year, and the five year average of 1,377,903,000 bushels.

Potatoes

The Oregon potato crop prospect declined somewhat during the month of September. Well informed potato men estimate the late crop of the state, on unirrigated land, at not more than 50 per cent of normal production. Hot dry weather during the latter part of August and early September checked the growth of vines and the crop was too far matured to be benefited by recent rains. The tubers will be undersized and the marketable per centage will thus be reduced. With an acreage somewhat reduced from last year, and the present condition of the crop it appears that the Oregon potato crop this year will probably not exceed 4,500,000 bushels, with the per centage of marketable size rather lower than usual. Last year's crop was estimated at 5,145,000 bushels and the five year average at 4,567,000 bu.

The United States crop showed an improvement during the month of about 12,000,000 bushels, and is now estimated at 401,424,000 bushels, compared with last year's crop of 451,385,000 bushels, and the five year average of 385,000,000 bushels.

Apples

The commercial apple crop prospect for the state showed further improvement and it is probable that our last month's estimate of 5,075,000 boxes will be exceeded. Whether the commercial crop will all be packed depends to some extent upon market prices during the next few weeks. The Idaho crop

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is estimated at about 145,000 boxes less than a month ago while the Washington crop is estimated at 750,000 boxes more than the estimate of last month.

The United States crop as a whole is estimated at a slightly lower figure than that of a month ago, the state of New York showing a decline of 532,000 bbls. (equivalent to 1,556 bushels). The total United States commercial crop is now estimated at 23,104,000 barrels. Last year's estimate was 20,852,000 bbls, and the 1921 crop was estimated at 21,557,000 bbls. (1 bbl. equals 2 bushels.)

Prunes

Prune drying is practically completed with very heavy losses reported from some sections on account of lack of their capacity. Even so, it also caused some loss particularly in the fruit which was not dried immediately after picking. It is judged woolmen.
