Authentic Pictures of Japanese Disaster to Be Shown at Star Monday and Tuesday

What should prove to be the most interesting picture that has been seen in La Grande is scheduled for showing Monday and Tuesday at the Star Theatre. This is the Paramount picture of the great Japanese earthquake and fire.

These films were secured by Tom D. Corkran and H. E. McIntyre, Paramount manager in Japan and it was through the co-operation of representatives of the Japanese Government as well as Canadian and American officials that they reached this country in record time. The film, which shows the ravaging conflagration which followed the earthquake as well as the buildings of Tokyo and Yokohama swaying and crumbling to the ground while the people rushed for safety, was rushed by airplane to Kobe to catch the Empress of Australia, of the Canadian Pacific Steamship Lines, only to find that the ship had sailed several hours before. The pictures were taken by seaplane and put aboard the vessel at a point 100 miles off Kobe.
