PIONEER LADY CALLED BEYOND

Death Takes Mrs. Peebler Late Friday; Funeral Services Sunday Afternoon.

Mrs. Peebler passed on at her home at 2135 Third street late Friday, her death being due to a lingering illness. She was 59 years of age at the time of her death. Her passing leaves one more vacancy in the list of pioneers of this county and leaves also a host of friends who sincerely mourn with her relatives in their bereavement.

Amelia Annetta Grubbe was born in Oregon county, Missouri, December 8, 1843. She crossed the plains when five years of age and settled in the Willamette valley. On August 10th 1859, she was married to John J. Peebler in Douglas county, Oregon, where they resided until 1863, when they came to Grande Ronde Valley where they have since made their home. Six children were born to this union, two daughters and three sons now surviving. They are Mrs. Olive Green Kelsey, Mrs. Clara Allen, E. T. H. W. and A. E. Peebler, all of La Grande. One daughter, Mary Allen, died in 1890. Mrs. Peebler's husband passed on February 22, 1914.

The remains are at the home. Funeral services will be held at the Lutheran chapel at two o'clock Sunday afternoon with William Crosby Ross, pastor of the Presbyterian church of La Grande, officiating. Interment will take place in the Masonic cemetery.
