Brake Tests Show That Franklin at 15 Miles An Hour Stops in 8 Ft. 2 In.

Statistics compiled by Safety First Bureaus in the large cities show that more automobile accidents occur at fifteen miles per hour than at any other speed.

Recognizing that an almost instantaneous stop at this speed is necessary to avoid collision with children at play or pedestrians who thoughtlessly step out from the curb, the Franklin Automobile Company recently made a public braking test.

A sedan, running at this normal traffic rate over city pavement, was stopped in 8 ft. 2 in. or in about two-thirds of the car's length. This distance is 12 ft. 6 in. better than the safety standard accepted for many years by leading engineering authorities. Stops at other speeds ranged from 70 per cent to 150 per cent better than the standard.
