Stansley, in Louisville, Ind., were burned to death when fire of undetermined origin destroyed the building Saturday night, according to a special dispatch to the Louisville Herald.

Automatic Camera to Snap Olympic

PARIS (AP) — The French Olympic Committee is experimenting with a mechanical photographic device to record the finishes of the running events during the 1924 Olympic Games. Thus far the experiments have been successful, and there is every likelihood that a camera will be on hand at the finish line of all races to confirm or infirm the ruling of the judges.

The arrangement is practically the same as that in use for some years in Belgium to photograph the finishes of horse races, and which is likely to be adopted at French race tracks next season.

A camera is set just over the finish line about three feet from the ground, and a string is stretched out across the track about the same height, and three feet from the actual finish. The string, upon being broken by the chest of the arriving winner, automatically releases the shutter, which snaps the runners just as they cross the line. The negatives are developed in two minutes.

The photograph also will record the time of the race to one-twentieth of a second. A huge clock nine feet in diameter will be installed right opposite the finish line inside the track in direct line with the camera. Through an electrical arrangement it will be released by the firing of the

Pendleton Wins--21 to 0 Baker and Joseph Lose

Hermiston Team Fights But Is Downed by Bucks; Baker Easy Meat for Enterprise; Wallowa Is Victor.

PENDLETON (Special to the Observer)—The strong Pendleton high school football team Saturday afternoon decisively defeated Hermiston high school 21 to 0 at Hermiston in a hard fought game. Hermiston, with a heavy team, showed unexpected strength and Coach Homer Taylor's protest's stock was boosted several notches due to their no uncertain victory. Pendleton is scheduled to meet the Kennewick, Washington team Saturday.

BAKER (Special to the Observer)—Responding to Baker high school's eleven a snappy, shifty and aggressive attack, the Enterprise high school team, light but speedy, defeated Baker 37 to 7 Saturday afternoon at Enterprise. The game was played under ideal conditions and before a good sized crowd. Neither team scored in the first quarter, but in the second the Enterprise gridlers began a series of run and forward passes which seemed to bewilder their opponents and scored two touchdowns before the end of the first half. Both goals were missed.

Three touchdowns for 221 points and a place kick from the 15-yard line accounted for Enterprise scores in the second half.

WALLOWA Defeats Joseph. WALLOWA (Special to the Observer)—While defeated by a score of 24 to 6, Joseph high school played Wallowa a plucky game and showed unexpected strength both in the line and the backfield. The whole line played well but both, at center, upstated by the two guards, formed an impenetrable wall. Cole and Lee at the halves played well offensively and starred on the defense. For Wallowa Captain Johnson at full back proved to right in leadership by stopping all line plays from end to end.

Joseph kicked off to Wallowa, quarterback Henderson returning the ball 15 yards. Johnson rushed through left tackle for 3 yards. Jones went through right tackle for first down but lost the ball when three Joseph men hit him simultaneously. This fumble seemed to take the life out of Wallowa and give it to Joseph. For 12 minutes Joseph was unable to gain consistently but played a wonderful defensive game. With two minutes left to go, Greer, left half for Wallowa, intercepted a forward pass and ran 50 yards for the first touchdown.

After this break Joseph seemed to lose confidence and Wallowa, who had been unable to score by their own
