MARTHA M. HALLER.

Martha M. Haller, widow of the late L. L. Haller, died at San Francisco, October 15th, as the result of an unsuccessful operation. Her many friends in Eastern Oregon are today mourning her passing on.

Martha Marie Blundell was born in London, England, April 15th, 1861, but at the age of six years she came to America accompanied by her parents and settled at Evanston, Wyoming. She was united in marriage to Isaac L. Haller September 15th, 1879, at Reno, Nevada. Shortly after the marriage the young couple moved to Kelton, Utah, later to Salmon River, Idaho, and in May 1883, they came overland to Union county where Mr. Haller filed for a homestead seven miles southeast of Talcott. For forty years the deceased has made the original holding her home.

She leaves to mourn her loss her immediate family: Mrs. Ruby Kennedy of Everett; Albert R. of Los Angeles; Francis Burns of Huntington, Alvin H. of Cove, Harold H. of North Powder, 27 grandchildren, three sisters, three brothers and a host of friends.

be abandoned, and that in its place a live, new sheet be established. "A plan should be provided whereby the national central organization could get in immediate and direct touch with all parts of the legion without going through the state organizations.

"It is never going to be possible to pick great leaders for the legion by political manipulation or by geographical designation. It may not seem the most democratic thing to do but at least it is by far the more efficient, to nominate by means of a nominating committee.

Haps Bonus Policy. "No matter how strongly one may be in favor of the bonus, he must at the same time acknowledge that it is a question in which the general public and the legion itself are not unanimous. It was a monumental error on the part of the legion to get behind this resolution, stating clearly and with dignity that the legion believes a great injustice has been done the ex-servicemen by not providing an adjustment of his compensation upon his return to civil life; that this obligation, which existed at that time, will continue to exist until it is paid; that the legion, however, was not organized to obtain a bonus and that it is anxious to start the work for which it was conceived, and that it therefore leaves in the hands of congress the matter of adjusted compensation and stands ready to abide by the decision of the people of America on this matter; that henceforth no discussion or action in regard to adjusted compensation would be permitted in the ranks of the American Legion.

"That the American Legion go on record with a declaration of policy that henceforth the only single thing which it will be interested in for itself exclusively is that which has to do with the care of the disabled. "A resolution should be proposed in this convention making it unconstitutional for anyone to run for national commander who was employed at national headquarters during the year of such election. "In my opinion, the legion should never straddle such matters as the Ku Klux Klan. It should come out unequivocally in condemnation of any such movement. I do not favor the legion actively combating such movements as the Ku Klux Klan, because to do that tends only to dignify them by the strength of our antagonism. This, however, does not prevent a forceful denunciation on the part of the legion, and when this is done no further action should be taken.

Kerr Makes Most Yardage Although Sherwood scored three touchdowns and his gains amounted to 122 yards, Kerr, halfback, gained a total of 165 yards. Kerr's gains were not as frequent as were Sherwood's but were longer on the average. Kerr carried the ball 14 times, 7 times for more than 10 yards. Sherwood carried the ball 13 times gaining over 19 yards but 4 times. Of a total of 458 yards gained by La Grande from scrimmage Sherwood made 122, Kerr 165, Garity 78, Price 67, Jacobson 4.

Metcalf's return of punts amounted to 41 yards. Glass returned 10 yards. Coker 29 and Sherwood 19. La Grande tried 10 passes with only one successful. Union tried 8 and succeeded with two of them.

La Grande intercepted two Union passes while Union intercepted but one. L. H. S. pass. Union made a total of 46 yards from scrimmage.

La Grande Points Often.

La Grande lost the ball on downs but once, usually punting on the fourth down. A check shows that the Blue and White team, with Sherwood kicking, punted 7 times for 290 yards. Union punted four times for 113 yards. Gilmore, of Union, punted 35 yards once and Sherwood punted 25 yards twice. Sherwood averaged 23.5 yards per punt while Gilmore averaged 28.3 yards per punt. Union made three first downs while La Grande marked up 17 first downs. All of the local's were from scrimmage while two of Union's were from forward passes. La Grande was penalized 45 yards while Union suffered no penalties. Of the 46 points scored, Sherwood garnered 13, Williams 6, Garity 6, Price 6, and Kerr 6. Coker converted four times out of 7 tries for 4 points.

The La Grande team fumbled some and showed up ragged at times but Kerr's, Garity's and Sherwood's consistent gains more than made up for the ragged work. It's a cinch, however, that L. H. S. can't afford to play ragged when they back up against the Buckaroos.

La Grande started Kerr, Sherwood, Metcalf and Garity in the backfield. Hummelt at center, Stager and Hughes at guard, Coker and Metcalf at tackles and Price and Williams ends. Glass substituted for Metcalf. Jacobson for Kerr, Strand for Stager, Samutz for Hughes, and Lynch for Price. Union started Fugot at center, Cadster and Kent at guards, Callahan and Jensen at tackle, Croeland and Geertson at end, Blucker at quarter, McCollan, Gilmore and Cadwell in the backfield. Casper went in at end, Callahan going into the backfield and Cadwell taking tackle in the last half.

Officials were: G. L. Dutton, referee, and D. E. J. Schuyter, umpire. The first team set a fine example

for the second team to follow but the scrubs did not do likewise. The game was more or less of a farce with the joke on La Grande. When the intermission came to an official end, the Union team had scored two touchdowns and a safety while La Grande had no points.

Next Friday La Grande plays the strong Milton-Freewater team at La Grande.

in our history. Disregard for all law is more effectively spread by the failure of the enforcement service than in any other way. All those facts, taken together, furnish abundant reason for treating this matter as of sufficient importance to enlist the active direction of the president himself. He alone, in my opinion, can meet the emergency.

"There is another reason why the president should take personal charge. Not only has the political hamstringing of the federal enforcement service had its seat in Washington but it is notorious that disobedience to the eighteenth amendment has been rampant in the capital city.

"It is foolish to expect the state and municipal police powers to cope with floods of illegal liquor let loose by the failure of federal agents to dam the flood at its source. Federal permission is required to export whisky which is smuggled back into the country for sale. Its breweries operating under federal permits as well as the regulations governing business under them should be revised and brought down to date in the light of the last three years' experience.
