BRITISH BOOZE RUNNERS ASK MORE CAPITAL

Government Makes Investigation, But Apparently Only to Curb Fraudulent Projects.

LONDON, (I. N. S.)—Despite the fact that the British government has expressed its desire to aid the United States in checking the smuggling of liquor into American ports, adventurous speculators are still continuing their appeals to British investors to put money in liquor dealing operations off the American coast.

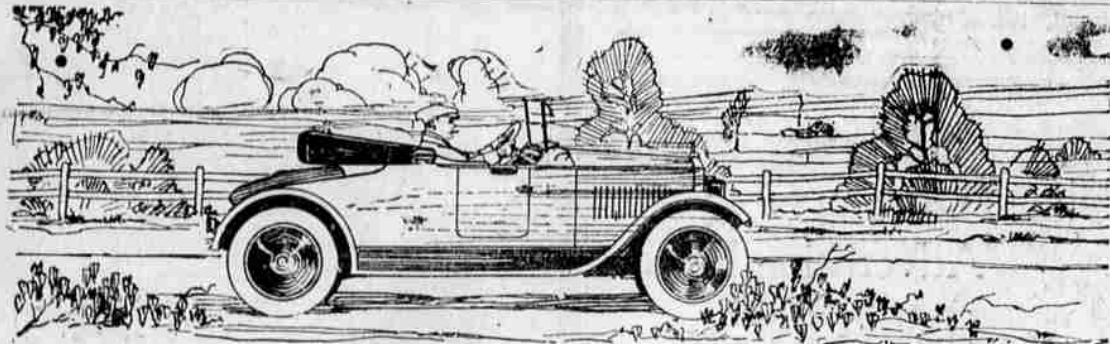

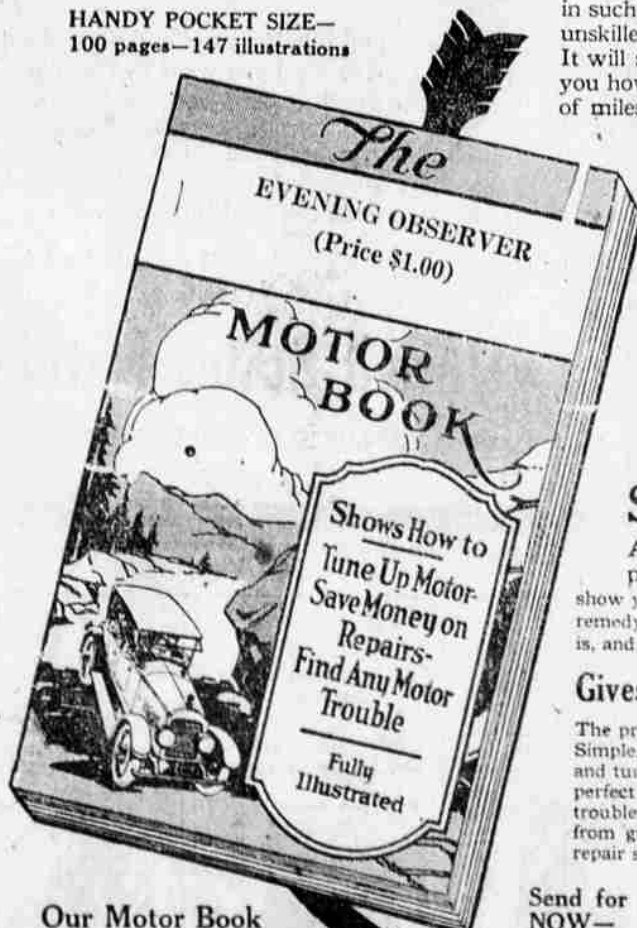
