WHITMAN vs. OREGON AT PENDLETON TODAY

Week-End—Friday and Saturday—Finds Northwest and Pacific Coast Teams in Critical Games.

PORTLAND, Ore. (INS)—This is a week-end of delectable football morsels designed to meet the taste of the most fastidious of intercollegiate football followers on the Pacific coast. One look at the schedule of our big contests for Friday and Saturday forenoon, some mighty good football and possibly some startling upsets. Here are the games:

Friday, October 19: Idaho vs. Washington state college at Pullman; Oregon vs. Whitman at Pendleton.

Saturday, October 20: U. S. C. vs. Washington at Seattle; U. S. C. vs. California at Berkeley; Gonzaga vs. Multnomah at Portland.

It is noted every contest is more or less a "critical" game. They mark the turn of the "big" season for the northwest and Pacific Coast universities, and every eleven is primed to battle through 60 minutes of the hardest kind of football.

The Idaho-Washington state game is being watched with particular interest. Idaho has proved its mettle in early season games, and the battle with the Vandals should prove whether the Vandals are to be reckoned with in the final ratings. Particularly so since W. S. C. enters the game under the wing of a 27-14 record administered by Gonzaga at Spokane last Saturday.

A. A. Kendall, the former excellent Indian player and Georgetown coach, incidentally is a student of football and the opinions are certain he will bring the "Changars" to victory before the season is over. Coach Stathos has his players fighting and has a fine array of talent. Bob Finkle, the Idaho punter and punner, is a phenomenon in himself.

Little Whitman may hold Oregon at the Round-Up park at Pendleton as it did Washington at Seattle last Saturday. Sig Horkes, the missionary coach, has the faculty of getting every ounce of labor and energy from his little band of fighters. Last year Oregon won 8 to 3, scoring two place kicks to one for Whitman. Being favored Oregon or Idaho, however, with Chapman, Lathrop and Ketchum-yellow, backfield stars—forming a fast running attack which will be hard to stop.

Can Washington hold U. S. C. at Seattle on Saturday? It is a question which perhaps can be better answered after the game. U. S. C. is admittedly strong on attack. And Washington has pointed its play to this contest with "Gloomy Gus" Henderson's name. Leonard Ziel, triple-threat Washington star, will be in the game and his appearance brings the Huskies to near an even bet against U. S. C.

Those who see Ernest Shipman's production, "The Man from Glengarry," a picture of Ralph Connor's widely read novel, which will be shown at the Sherry theatre today will have an opportunity to witness some of the most unique stunts that have ever been flashed on the screen.

One of the most interesting and entertaining incidents is a log-rolling or "log-birevilling" contest which is staged between two expert lumberjacks. As a test of skill in balance and sure-footedness, saw-tooth walking has nothing on this. Two men stand upright on a large slippery log in the centre of the stream. Each one of them proceeds to manipulate the log with his feet by running similar to a man trying to walk on a barrel or revolving globe. The log proceeds to spin faster and faster. The ease and dexterity with which these lumberjacks display in maintaining their footing on the rapidly revolving log is remarkable and is one of the entertaining incidents in the picture.

In one scene wherein one "log roller" strives to show his supremacy over another, rivalry and zeal overmastered wisdom. The log spinning became a real contest and one spinner was hurled from his revolving perch into the chills and turbulent river.
