WHITE SOX MANAGER GIVES UP HIS JOB

CHICAGO (By the Associated Press)—William "Big" Gleason, the fiery manager of the Chicago White Sox since 1915, resigned Wednesday, making the fourth managerial change in the club since the opening of the 1922 season.

The 53-year-old pilot, with a record of 37 years in baseball, resigned, he said, because he was discouraged with his attempts to reconstruct the club, wrecked with the exposure of the world's series scandal with Cincinnati in 1919. He set "about to rebuild the club when the players who participated in the 'frame-up' were dropped but in the three seasons that have passed, Gleason's faith spirit alone carried him through, as he had little success in the development of a new team.

"I've given the best that's in me, and the boys did the best they knew how," Gleason said Wednesday night. "But we didn't seem to be able to get anywhere. A change often works wonders so I decided to step out and give somebody else a chance."

There has been no word from President Comiskey of the White Sox, as to the successor of the disgraced veteran.

2,000 DEAL IN DRUGS IN STATE

PORTLAND (By the Associated Press)—According to a survey made today by Collector of Internal Revenue Huntley, covering registrants who hold permits under the Federal Government to manufacture, dispense, and use narcotics in the Oregon Police District, it was found that there are practically 2,000 of such registrants of all classes in this district.

It was discovered by this report that there are in this district approximately 130 delinquent registrants who have failed to file the necessary return and receive authorization for the manufacture and administration of narcotics under the Harrison Narcotic Act.

Collector Huntley warned such delinquents that the mere fact that they held no narcotics in their

possession did not relieve them from the necessity of properly registering, and that if they retained any order for narcotics issued by the Internal Revenue Bureau, and failed to register, or to return same to the department for cancellation, they held such forms legally and responsible for the same, to the penalties under the Harrison Narcotic Act.

A list of all delinquents who have failed to register or to properly account for order forms for narcotics held by them is being prepared in Collector Huntley's office, and officers of the Internal Revenue Office will soon check up delinquent registrants who should have registered not later than July 1, and to enforce the provisions of the Act.

An amendment to the Act, or a term of imprisonment of five years, or both, may be imposed upon violators of the Narcotic laws, Collector Huntley strongly urges that all have not made the necessary accounting of order forms and narcotics to do so at once and avoid liability to the penalties which may attach.

NO PREMIER SAYS REPUBLICANS

WASHINGTON—There will be no premier in the government of the United States if Republican leaders at the Senate can prevent it.

Proposals by political scientists for the creation of the office of premier ranking next to the President of the United States, have met with the almost total opposition of administration leaders recently.

The plan was suggested as a means of relieving the President of numerous duties following the breakdown and fatal illness of the late President Harding. While some proposals are favored for relieving the President of minor tasks, suggestions involving a change in the fundamental system of one-man control in the Executive branch of the Government are frowned upon generally.

Opposition was aroused against the premier proposal, leaders said, because it required not only a change in the constitution but would lessen the powers of the President, divide party leadership and sometimes re-

side in a coup of administration when men of opposing parties were elected to the highest offices.

Although there is opposition to this plan, administration leaders are seeking other means of making the President's job easier. It is pointed out that the late President Roosevelt taxed his great strength beyond capacity in an effort to meet all the tasks imposed on him while in office; that President Wilson suffered a complete breakdown and that President Harding's death was hastened by the tremendous amount of work undertaken while in the White House.

Would Cut Burden.

Republican leaders rather than create a new office undoubtedly will support a movement to authorize the designation of minor officials for carrying on the untold number of trifling duties now given to the President to perform. These would include the designation of the power to sign his name to minor state papers and thousands of documents passing through Government departments and to permit Cabinet members to make final decisions on all intra-departmental matters.

The position of Administration leaders was explained by Senator Charles Curtis, of Kansas, Republican whip in Senate and chairman of the powerful Rules Committee.

"If the President would refer all the work he should to the heads of departments and turn trifling details over to his legal assistants—the Cabinet members—he would easily fill all the necessary duties of his office without severe physical strain. Congress also can authorize that certain official documents, which he now must sign, can be signed by other officials of the Administration.

"It is unnecessary to create the office of premier and I think it would

be an unwise move. We don't need offices; rather we need less. To create a premier would necessitate an amendment to the constitution, and even if the plan were generally favored it would be years before it could become effective.

Too Much Detail.

"The trouble with President Harding was that he looked over every

paper sent to the White House. He inquired personally into every portion of these cases. There were thousands of hours studying the papers of each case when they already had been approved by the department of justice. He overworked himself on these details when his friends were advising him to rest.

"What the United States needs to do is to reduce the number of officials. There are too many now, too many commissions and too many Federal boards. They are only a drain on the taxpayer."

Senator Harold, Republican of Oklahoma, echoed Curtis' statement.

"There might be some favor for the appointment of a premier by the President, subject to confirmation by the Senate and to rank with Cabinet officers, but there will be NO support of a proposal for the creation of an elective office," said Harold. "To elect a premier a premier would be

to divide and confuse authority in the executive branch of the Government."

"We have experienced the election of a Democratic President and a Republican Congress. If we elected a premier from one party and a President from the other there would be endless confusion and four years of deadlock in our Government.

"Something should be done, however, to relieve the President of minor duties. This can take the form of delegating some of his powers on minor matters to Cabinet officers. Congress may take such action when it next meets."
