The condition of highways in Eastern Oregon according to the weekly report of the State Highway commission is:

La Grande-Joseph Highway.
La Grande-Island City: Under construction for resurfacing and widening; two mile detour necessary; dry, four well marked and in fair condition. Highway open to traffic after working hours. Watch out for construction equipment.
Island City-Alice: Excellent condition.
Alice-Imbler: Under construction for macadamizing; lane course completed; section through Grande Ronde canyon now open; careful driving required north of Philnehart bridge where traffic passes under rock bunkers.
Elgin-Miam: Wallowa - Lostline-Enterprise-Joseph: Macadamized and in excellent condition.
Joseph-Wallowa Lake: Good condition.
Baker-Cornucopia Highway.
Baker-Halfway: 43 miles macadam.

Baker-Unity Highway.
Road over Dooley Mountain. Fair county road.
Oregon-Washington Highway.
Pendleton-Washington State Line: Paved.
Pendleton-Pilot Rock-Vinson: Five miles good earth road; 26 miles good macadam.
Vinson-Bitter Creek-Jones Hill: County road. Very rough and rocky but passable.
Jones Hill - Heppner Junction: Junction of Columbia River highway; Macadamized and in excellent condition.
Old Oregon Trail East of The Dalles.
Ontario - Huntington - Baker - Union - La Grande - Pendleton - Umatilla - Arlington - The Dalles: Macadamized entire distance and in excellent condition.

Knights Templar to Meet in Pittsburg

SPOKANE, (AP)—Plans for the big convalescence and pilgrimage to the northwest in 1925 by the Knights Templar of Commandery No. 1, Pittsburg, Pa., are being worked out with mathematical correctness, according to members of the pathfinding commission, who arrived in the city recently.

Nearly two years before the pilgrimage comes westward, these knights, known as the advanced guard, are preparing a schedule and tabulating every step on the long journey.

The train will pull out from Pittsburg at 5 o'clock the night of Saturday July 19, 1925, making brief stops enroute. Arriving here at 5:20 P. M. Thursday, July 23, the party will be the guests of the city until the last night. The following day they will reach Seattle, where the gathering is to be held.

SPIRITUALISM RELIGIOUS AID, THINKS DOYLE

Creed Will Be End of Dark Ages in Which We Now Live, He Declares.

LONDON.—Modern spiritualism is not a substitute for religion but an amplification of it that will "save it from the extinction with which it is obviously threatened," according to Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, spiritualism's most earnest defender in England.

Returning from his recent lecture tour of Canada and the United States, Sir Arthur outlined his views on the future of spiritualism. He boldly characterized spiritualism as the creed that "will be the end of the dark ages in which we now live."

Sir Arthur prefaced his views on the future of spiritualism by a detailed recital of evidence which he asserted proved conclusively the existence of an intelligence back of the various spiritualistic phenomena. He asserted that tests performed for the benefit of skeptical scientists had proved to the satisfaction of the skeptics that psychic manifestations are controlled by a definite intelligence.

"The enormously important point at issue then," said Sir Arthur, "is the intelligence of the entranced medium? Is it the subconscious intelligence of the combined company? Is it an independent intelligence?"

"Surely, when it takes the extreme form of materialization and walking about the room, as it recently did in experiments conducted before a French committee of scientists, one cannot hesitate to say that the intelligence is an independent one. If that be granted our whole case is won; disincarnate intelligence save those which have lived upon earth. Every line of evidence, physical phenomena, mental phenomena, photography, materializations, all converge upon the one conclusion; but from my point of view it is only here that the real importance of the matter begins."

"If our reasoning is sound and we are indeed in contact with disincarnate intelligences, then clearly they can tell us where they are, how they live, what the world is like in which they find themselves, and how far their religious teaching in this world corresponds with their actual experience."

"This volume of evidence I have called the New Revelation. I believe that it is a revelation of truth sent straight from God to give a stricken and doubting world a clear view of its own destiny. In my opinion it is not less important than the Christian revelation of 2,000 years ago. It is presumably a continuation of it, since Christ said that He had yet other things to say but the time was not yet."

"That first revelation is the last word in ethics. Nothing can supersede it in that direction, but the second, in that light, is a revelation of knowledge which man needs and has a right to have."

"The two revelations put together will make the religion of the future, which will expand Christianity and remove from it those blemishes which have shocked our reason. Religion is the basis of all things, and until we get that right neither politics, economics nor anything else can be built upon a rock."

"But when we do get a clear perception of what we are and why we are here those difficulties will vanish and human life will be infinitely simpler and happier."

OWN OWNED HOMES DECREASE, OREGON

Oregon was one of 31 states in the Union in which the percentage of families owning their homes showed a decrease during the period from 1920 to 1922, according to a pamphlet "How to Own Your Home," which has been issued by the Department of Commerce as a handbook for prospective home owners.

In 1920 the percentage of Oregon families owning their homes was 53.1, and in 1922 this had fallen to 51.3 per cent. This means that out of every 1,000 families living in Oregon 513 owned their homes in 1922.

In spite of this, however, the Pacific States ranked fourth, according to the geographic division of the states, in 1922, and was above the average for the entire country, which was 45.6 per cent.
