Americans Occupy Corfu Palace of Former Kaiser

CORFU (AP)—From primitive hut to Kaiser's palace in the fairy story reality of 1918, the palace now is the headquarters of the Italian mission of the former German emperor, situated along the coast about five miles from here. The boys are all under American care, being the wards of the New East Relief and directed by H. R. Murphy, of Lawrenceville, Mass.

The luxurious gardens, filled with tropical growths and dotted with statues, give the place a chance to enjoy an imperial world. They do not maintain a dignity such as an emperor is supposed to maintain, but enjoy them as they are. Their walking consists mainly in romping and playing. Great affairs of state do not seem to bother them. All seem to be happy.

"Oh," said one of them to the Associated Press correspondent, "we are all happier than the emperor himself."

The villa was constructed first for the late Emperor Elizabeth of Austria. It is ponderous in its style with lavish decoration everywhere. There is a striking statue in the center of the garden called "The Flying Aethiops." It is the best piece of original sculpture in the garden. There is a bronze statue of colossal proportions in the very front of the garden, overlooking the sea. It also is Achilles and is supposed to represent the former Kaiser.

The Greek government has tried to take over the property but as it is the private property of the former German emperor they cannot proceed with their purpose. During the recent Italian occupation of the island, it was a favorite resort of the Italian officers, who would go there as far as a day in the country.

Plans Made to Combat Skyscraper Burglaries

CHICAGO (AP)—The gentlemen burglar who operates only in offices located in skyscrapers will have it much harder now to live in the future as the result of a real two-sided plan just inaugurated by the National Association of Building Owners and Managers.

Photographs, descriptions of dress, peculiarities and in the case of known burglars, instruments, of these men who are known or suspected of belonging to the gang of skyscraper burglars will be sent to every elevator starter and every doorman of every large building in the United States whenever an epidemic of such burglaries presents itself, according to the announcement made at the headquarters of the association today.

The officials of the association are confident that an organized gang of highly trained crooks operate in skyscrapers. They give as the reason for this belief that the skyscraper burglaries come in epidemic form, the latest being prevalent in San Francisco. The system used in the Golden Gate city is precisely the same used in the east, south and middle western cities at various times during the past two years.

The method used, the officers say, is for some well dressed and well educated member of the gang to work his way into the good graces of some high social set. He gains the confidence of numerous men of affairs and learns the probable location of money or securities in these men's offices. He then learns the time when the securities will probably be in the office, and the job is put through in accordance with this information.

Sweden Expects Soon To Send Ore to Ruhr

STOCKHOLM (AP)—Sweden's industries will be affected both favorably and unfavorably by the settlement of the Ruhr conflict, according to the third quarterly statement for 1923 which has just been issued by the Royal Board of Trade. It is pointed out that in normal times the Ruhr district took about two-thirds of the total export of Swedish iron ore. This market was closed by the French occupation, and the Swedish ore producers have been diverting their shipments to America, and elsewhere, while large stocks have also been accumulating in June ports.

In the near future Germany will doubtless again become a large importer of Swedish ore. On the other hand, Swedish machine shops, especially those manufacturing mining machinery, paper-

making machinery, and motors, have been prospering because the previously severe competition from Germany ceased with the occupation of the Ruhr. Renewed competitive offerings from Central Europe will force the prices on Swedish machinery down to the minimum margin of profit, and the hopes of being able to continue considerable exports in the high quality of native materials used and the excellence of workmanship.

Fruit Packer Sets Record

HOOD RIVER, Or.—The season's apple-packing record here has been set by T. P. Shney, a professional California fruit packer. Mrs. C. C. Casey wife of an upper valley rancher, equaled Mr. Shney's record as a packer. For a six-day period the two averaged 229 boxes of fruit without help and Mr. Shney living his own boxes.
