PASTOR SEEKS BIG SUM FOR SLANDER

ONTARIO CENTER, N. Y. (I.N.S.)—Statements alleged to have been made by Peter Vandine, a member of the First Presbyterian church of this village, that the Rev. Grant G. McChesney, pastor of the church, was guilty of misappropriating the funds of the church and that he was "a crook," statements which, according to the complaint filed by the Rev. McChesney, caused the presbytery to request his resignation, are the basis today of a 10,000 suit for slander filed by Rev. McChesney. The request that McChesney resign was later rescinded when the pastor indicated himself.

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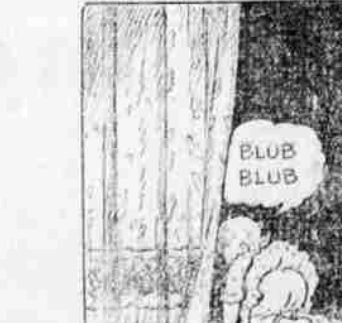

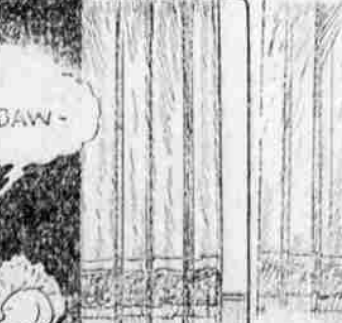
